EJG:egh MM 44-270

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent EUGENE J. GARBUTT on February 5, 6, 7 and 8, 1952, at Riviera Beach, Florida.

BASIS: JOSEPH PAULK, Riviera Beach, Florida, advised he believed Elder WILLIAMS and Deacon DANSEL of Riviera Beach were close friends of victim HARRY T. MCORE.

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Elder FRED WILLIAMS, minister, Church of God and Christ, North Dixie Highway, identified himself as being the state chaplain and member of the executive committee of the Progressive Voters Lacque of Florida. He said he attended HARRY T. MCORE's funeral and that his last contact with MOORE was in November, 1951 and consisted of only a passing conversation. According to WILLIAMS, MCORE never made any remarks concerning threats against his life. He added that MCORE and his wife were well liked in and out of the NAACP and the Progressive Voters League of Florida. However, he remarked that based on the reported vote of the Daytona Beach Convention in November, 1951, there is a possibility that some group may have disliked him. He was unable to supply any facts, names or rumors as to who or what group would possibly have desired abolishment of MCORE's job.

WILLIAMS advised he received a letter from MCORE postrarked Mins, Florida, dated about one week prior to the bombing. The letter requested that WILLIAMS secure some records regarding the shooting of a negro named JACKSON by ALST. JOHN, policement, Riviera Beach Police Department. WILLIAMS stated MCORE wanted the records to turn over to an unknown attorney.

According to WILLIAMS, MCORE had no bitter enchies. However, ARTHUR BROWN, president of the Riviera Beach Voters League, has had differences with MCORE. He said BROWN controls a large voting block in the colored clement of Riviera Beach and wishes to be the "b' 3 shot". MCORE has always attempted to get the opposing groups to vote in one block. Due to this MCCRE and BROWN have occasionally disagreed but there have never been any "terrible frictions" between BROWN and MCORE.

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was going too far in his work with the NAMCP and the Progressive Voters League of Florida. He said HARRY at that time told him he was going to carry on that work if it cost him his life. He said HARRY told him that "JESUS CHRIST lost his life doing what he thought was right." Further, that he felt the Lord intended him to carry on this work for the colored race and he intended to do it to his death. He said at the time he may live to be a ripe old age, that he may be killed the following day, the next month or perhaps never.

NORMAN CONTES said that at no time did HARRY MOORE indicate to him that he anticipated any trouble with anyons and he at no time heard that he had any trouble in correction with his work or otherwise. CO.TES said that he did not accompany HARE on any of his trips although he himself was very active in NAACP work.

CONTES went on to say that H.ART MOORE, together with other individuals, and approached the Sheriff and has asked that consideration be given to the appointment of a colored deputy to work among the colored people in Brivard County. CONTES said that his name was one of three submitted to the Sheriff for consideration. CONTES said that approximately three or four weeks ago Sheriff FILLIAMS had contacted him and asked if he, CONTES, would consider an appointment as a Deputy Sheriff in Brevard County. CONTES said to told the Sheriff he would not consider such a position because of his health. In explanation of this he said that he was not allowed by his doctors to engage in any arduous physical exercise or work that he might be called upon to perform as a Deputy Sheriff.

COLUES said that he regarded Sheriff WILLIMIS very highly and said that the Sheriff had the utmost respect and was well thought of among the colored people in Erevard County.

COATES said that he had never made any rips to Groveland with HART MOORE, however, he believed that C. H. "DELCOR" McCLAIN of Melbourne or NETLAN TUCKER of Cocca may have accompanied HARRY to Groveland in connection with the NAACP.

Mr. C. H. "DEACON" McCLaIN of Midbourne, Florida, advised that he has known Middy T. 18008, the victim, for approximately 10 years. He said he last saw him on Friday, December 21, 1951 for a new minutes. Nechain clated that a meeting of the Namel and the Progressive Venera League was planned for the Helbourne area on Sunday, December 30, \$51. He said on the occasion of his meeting with HARRY MOORE on December 21, 1951 that the victim did not indicate to him that he anticipated any trouble or that he had been threatened or feared any violence.

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Regarding the victim's activities McCL.IN said that most of his knowledge concerning MOORE's activities were obtained from reading the "TAFF. BULLETIN", a colored newspaper published weekly in Tampa, Florida. He said occasionally the victim did some writing for the TAFP. BULLETIN.

MAMOP and the Progressive Voters league. Approximately a month ago they had a State Conference of the NAMOP in Daytona Beach. McCLAIN said he was one of the delegates from the Brevard County Chapter of the WAMOP attending the conference. On this occasion he said it was brought up at the conference that the NAMOP in Florida did not have sufficient funds to pay for a State Secretary and therefore at was the intention of the conference to abolish that position. He said EARMY T. HOORE, after the above processal was made, spoke to the conference and said he would be willing to carry on his work without a salary. He said that the victim told the conference that the MAMOP exced him \$2,600.00 in salary and expenses.

McCL.III said that MARRY T. MOORE was nominated for the position of Secretary, however, only a very few votes, and not sufficient to recreate the gob of Secretary were made. He said that he counted the votes and therefore he know very definitely that very few of the delegates, and as a matter of fact only three or four wound for HARRY HOORE as Secretary, therefore, he said the position was, as fan as he knew, abolished. McCLaIN said that he would make collections for thee in the Helbourne area and for each dellar that he would have over to HARRY MOORE he would receive a dues dard. He said that he had mondered himself as to the means of livelihood of WARDY MOORE inesmuch as he was not being paid a sclary by the MaaCP. He said undoubtedly it cost MOORE quite a lot of money to traval throughout the State of Florian and to pay his expenses for living and the upkeep of his automobile. McCLaIN said that to his knowledge, mail? MOORE had no other source of laceme than his NAACP work. McCLAIN . "d that he did not have any knowledge whatsoever of any of the activities of HARRY MCCRE which would possibly lead to or cause his murder.

Mr. HARRY GOODE, owner of "HARRY's Sporting Goods Storem at Melbourne, Florida, advised that he was Chairman of the Sebastian Indet District. Mr. GOODE stated that during the war The Sebastian Indet, between the Indian River and the Ocean, had filled in and the Cabastian Indea District desired to open the inlet for conservated and pleasure purposes. He said it was necessary for them to obtain considerable explosive material in order to blast the inlet open and through Senator CLAUDE PEPPER the District obtained some wartime explosive material that was in a solid form. He said that he did not recall the name or type of material but that he did know it was extremely powerful,

and HARRY discussed the Groveland case and the possibilities of the new trial of WALTER LIE IRVIN. He said most of the afternoon was spent discussing Florida State politics. He said they discussed the last Governor's race and the election of FULLER WARREN and also the coming Governor's race and the possibilities thereof insofar as the negro welfare was concerned.

SILMS said that HARRY did not mention his activities to him during the last month but he did recall him stating he had been in Hilton and Defuniak Springs, Florida. He said HARRY mentioned that the colored homes in these towns appeared to be very nice homes, which were substantially build and that he, HARRY, believed that either town would be a nice place for colored people to live. He made no explanations or showed no indication that he possessed any fear whatsoever for his life. The general conversation was routine.

SILAS was unable to advance any theory as to the identity of any suspects though he did feel that the death of MODIE was a direct result of his activities in connection with the NAACP work as well as the Progressive Voters League, however, in this connection SILAS made the observation that due to his closeness to LOONE he felt that MOONE would not have made any explanation of any threats made against his life or any fear that he possessed because he was not the type who would want him, SILAS, to worry about it.

STEMS said a man by the name of JOHN GILBERT, who resides in Cocoa and who was very active in the Progressive Voters League and NamcP work was active with HARRY MOORE and he believed very close to HARRY MOORE. SILAS explained that JOHN GILBERT was formerly the Principal of the Cocoa Negro High School and had lost his job when he was working with MOORE to raise the negro teachers calarics to the same level as white teachers.

SILAS said that both he and HARRY MOORE were charter members of the Brevard County Chapter of the Progressive Voters League of Florida, Inc. as well as the Brevard Chapter of the NAACP. SILAS likewise expressed the opinion he believed the Groveland case could very likely have been responsible for this incident.

ELMER SILLS stated at the present time he is employed as a building custodian at the PatrickHenry Air Force Base, Cocoa, Florida.

712-30-51 While ASAC BURKE was in telephonic conversation with ANN SIMES, mother of victim HATRIETT MOORE, who was visiting HARRETT at Canford Memorial Hospital, Mrs. SIMES stated that Mr. WALTER WHITE was there and would like to

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speak with Mr. PURKE. Mr. WHITE asked who was in charge of the investigation in Mims and was advised that BURKE was in charge at the immediate scene. WHITE then indicated that he had some information of value and would like to talk with BURKE and would appreciate it if he, WHITE, could be met at the hospital where ne would furnish the information mentioned and in turn WHITE would instruct victim HARRIETT MOORE in the presence of agents to furnish all information in her possession to Agents of the FBI.

BURKE, in company with Special Agent FRANK F. MEECH met Mr. WHITE at the Sanford Memorial Hospital in Sanford at which time Mr. WHITE advised Agents that Mrs. MOORE was definitely reluctant to talk to officials, particularly local officials, about the incident or the possible cause thereof. He said she was likewise reluctant to talk of any activities of HARRY's prior to the incident. He stated, however, that he had advised Mrs. MOORE to furnish all information that she had to FBI Agents as it was necessary in order to successfully conclude this matter that the FBI be in possession of all information available.

Mr. WHITE then advised that Mrs. MCORE had told him that prior to the 1950 elections in Prevard County HARRY had directed a questionnaire to all candidates for election inquiring as to their respective stands on matters pertaining to racial issues setting out that the negro vote could be directed to those who looked upon these issues with favorinsofar as the negro was concerned. Mr. WHITE added that HARRIETT had told him that her husband never stayed alone at their home in Hims unless it was necessary; that she had told him shortly after the 1950 elections someone had telephoned HARRIETT from Orlando and said for them not to come to Mims as some people were hanging around the house and that "some Crackers were going to get HARRY."

Mr. WHITE said he had learned from HAFFFATT that HUTZLER, Superintendent of Public Instruction in Breverd County, had told FARRY MOORE whe was going too far and something had to be done." He said HARRIETT had informed him that she did not believe anyone around hims had anything to do with the death of her husband but she did suspect that it originated from Titusville.

Mr. WHITE continued that Mrs. MOOGE believed the main motivation for the death of her husband came from Brevard County and possibly also from the Groveland case.

Mr. WHITE said he had learned that in the early 1940's the School Board did not renew HARRY 1007E's school contract. He said a group of people petitioned the School Board and that he was taken back for a two year period at which time his contract was again not renewed; that a young man arrived in

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Brevard County to replace HARRY MOORE, however, after learning of HARRY's position he, the young man, refused to take the job. He said the School Board, without a replacement was obliged to give HARRY HOORE his contract and then in 1946 both HARRY MOORE and his wife's contracts were not renewed. Mr. WHITE said Hrs. MOORE since 1946 had twice approached the School Board to request a teaching contract but the Boarddid not see fit to give her a contract.

Mr. WHITE went on to state that HARRIETT MOORE is quite convinced that Sheriff WILLIAMS and Assistant States Attorney NUBERT GRIGGS know who did the bombing.

Mr. WHITE continued that he had learned through Rev. R. K. JOHNSON of Orlando, Florida that one ED FLAKE of the Citrus Exchange in Mims had said on numerous occasions "MOORE should have his neck broken for putting ideas into negroes heads." Mr. WHITE said he wanted to give the above information to the agents by way of background before Mrs. MOORE was interviewed in his presence.

It will be noted at this point that during the telephonic conversation had by BURKE with Mr. WHITE that the latter mentioned that he had learned that a piece of metal was taken from the body of victim HARRY T. MOORE and that he expected to obtain same from the funeral home and would have it available upon arrival of agents at the hospital. He stated, however, that it developed into merely a rumor, "that he had learned definitely that there was no broken skin and no metal entered the body and same had been determined to be a rumor.

Agents were introduced to victim HARRIETT MOORE by WALTER WHITE of which time Mrs. MOORE furnished substantially the same information as had been related by WHITE. However, upon specific destioning Mrs. MOORE revealed the name of the person who had called her while she and her husband were in Orlando, to advise it would be unsafe to come to their home in Mims that particular weekend, stating it was her brother, ARNOLD SINGS.

HARRIETT on being questioned specifically as to whether or not she possessed any ideas as to who might have perpetrated instant crime, answered in the negative though she did indicate, as previously mentioned, that she felt it came from Titusville. At this point she stated that a Hr. MASH, who is a member of the School Board in Titusville, had at some time told HARRY that he, NASH, did not appreciate some of the activities being carried on by MOORE in connection with trying to get negroes to vote in the Democratic primary and that at sometime Mr. HUTZLER had told HARRY his contract was not

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent EDE/IN M. DUFF II on January 1, 1752:

BASIS: HORACE HILL, member of Daytona Boach NAACP.

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HORACE HILL, 527 Second Avenue, Daytona Beach, Florida and a number of the Daytona Beach branch of the NAACP, said he had known income intimately since 1949 and had met MORIE shortly after the rape case occurring at Croveland during the summer of 1949. HILL said that he had talked with MORIE during the Daytona Beach convention of the MAACP in Movember, 1951 and that HOORE had never at any time told of receiving any threats nor had he ever mentioned that he had any enemies and neither had HILL heard of any enemies actually mentioned subsequent to the boroing of MORIE's here.

With regard to specific incidents which might have been the underlying basis for the bombing of HOORE's home, HILL said that he know MOORE had written a letter to JESS HUNTER, State's Attorney, informing HUNTER that he, HOORE, was doing everything he could "to see that justice was done in the Greveland case." HILL said that as far as he know, MOORE's letters had been acknowledged by HUNTER and that there had never been any indication of any threat contained in them either weiled or otherwise.

HILL suggested that EDMALD DAVIS, Ocala MAACP, Secretary of the Progressive Voters League, be interviewed as he said that DAVIS and MOORE were very close.

MILL recalled that about two hours after the explosion on Christman night he had received a telephone call from HOOME's daughter, ANNE, from Titusville telling him that her father's home had been bombed and that they had just taken her father to the Sanford Hospites.

Waters League had transmitted a resolution to Governor FULLER MANNEN vigorously protesting the approintment of Senator JOHN MATHE'S of Jacksonville to the Supreme Court bench in the State. HILL said that MATHE'S appointment was severely criticized by MONE because MATHE'S is one who advocated 100% white supremacy" and who, while serving in the State Logiclature, offered a bill to disfranchize the negroes. WILL believed that the letter criticizing the MATHE'S appointment was also signed by F. A. DUMN of St. Petersburg and he remembers rending the letter in its entirety in either the Pittsburgh COURTER or the Tarpa RULLETIN.

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HILL recalled that during the hovember meeting of the MAACP in Daytona Beach, HOORE had come to his, HILL's, office and in a more or less "bull session", HOORE had spoken of some of his past activities, among them, HILL said, was mention of the fact that HOORE had been successful in securing the appointment of a negro deputy sheriff in Broward County. HOORE mentioned that Sheriff AHOS HALL had promised that he would appoint a negro deputy and that such a deputy was appointed sometime in 1951.

HTLL recalled that while MOORE was attending Bethune-Coolean College an incident occurred at a beer joint in the Tomoka River section, near Orword Beach, when some colored boy had been cut up by a white man and HTLL recalled that MOORE had actively investigated that incident, and during the investigation had talked with ROORE TILLS, Constable and Chief of Police in Orword Beach, and also with State's Attorney MIRLAY SAMS at DeLand.

HILL said that this incident occurred several years ago.

HILL said he knew of no information concerning MOORE's activities subsequent to his departure from Daytona Beach in November, 1951, and that he knew that most of the time NOORE traveled alone, but occasionally his wife accompanied him.

HILL advised that he had represented the defendants in the rape case at Tavares during their first trial and that he believed "that all officials in Lake County held the MAMC" in contempt."

HILL recalled that MOCRE had headed a mass meeting in Orlando one month after the rape case was precipitated in Groveland which was in July or August, 1949. HILL recalled that MOCRE was to most THURGOOD MARSHAL in Orlando on November 9, 1951 in connection with a meeting held there on behalf of MAITER DE ERVIN and SARMEL SHEPHERD and that MAISHAL had wired MOCRE to meet him there and MOCRE had wired MAISHAL that he would be there. However, MILL said that MOCRE failed to show up to this meeting on November 9th and failed to notify MARSHAL that he was up to come.

HILL said that about three weeks are ROERT L. CARTER, MAAGP Counsel from New York City had visited HILL in Daytona Beach and told HILL that the NAACP verys were "mondering if MOON; hadn't gotten cold feet" because he had promised to meet MARSHAL in Onlando and had failed to show.

Lith regard to the dissention in the racks of the NAMCP, HILL said that the Birmingham and Tampa groups felt that FOOME was "not militant enough" and was "not able to stir the people" and that his MAMCP work was lagging. He said that there was no personal animosity toward MOOME and that

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the dissention was "just a political situation within the NAACP."

HILL suggested that "Captain" MALL, a member of the MAACP who lives at Eatonville (near Orlando, Florida) be interviewed for information concerning MOONE as MALL is supposed to have been very close to the victim.

He also suggested the name of R. H. Johnson, Orlando as one who might be able to furnish information.

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The following investigation was conducted by Special Agents CLYDE P. ADMINIOLD and TOBIAS E. MATTHEWS on January 1, and 2, 1952.

BASIS: O. K. WASHINGTON while being interviewed on another matter on January 1, 1952, advised that on approximately December 18, or 19, he was driving a tractor on the old Dixio Highway and saw two men in a green pick-up truck parked in an orange grove in front of HARRY T. MOOHE's home. The truck had been backed into the grove on the east side of the highway and was facing directly toward the MOUNE home. WASHINGTON said that he identified one of the mon in this truck as being the "DUNN boy", son of Brevard County Commissioner DUNN. He also observed GEORGE SHARPE standing in SHARPE's grove near where the green truck was parked.

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GEORGE SHAPE, Mims, Florida, advised that he could not remember sceing the green pick-up truck parked in the Orange grove located in front of the MOORE house east of the old Dixie Highway. He explained that they had been working on the grove and that he had not paid any attention to what was going on there.

TATIOR DUNN, owner of DUNN's Fruit Stand, Mims, Florida, advised that he had lived in and around Mims all of his life. He said that on about December 18, or 19 he had contacted IRA NORLES to see about purchasing some tangerims. He said that on one morning he met NORLES in the orange grove located in front of MOORE's house on the cast side of the old Dixia Highway. DUNN advised that the was about 11:00 AM and that he got into NOBLES truck and they drove around the grove locking for some tangerines. DUNN said that to the best of his recollection he had only met NOBLES on one morning. DUNN advised that he had no information as to who might have bombed the MOORE residence.

IRA MOBLES, Texaco Doaler, Titusville, Florida, advised that he owned some orange groves near the residence of MOORE. He stated that he was not acquainted with MOORE and had never answn until the bombing that MOORE had near his property. MOBLES recalled that shortly before Christmas he had not TAILOR DUNN in an orange grove near hims. He explained that the purpose of this meeting was to sell DUNN some targerings.

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
