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The following investigation was conducted by Special Agents FRANK F. WITTECH and ROBERT L. SUNKEL on January 2, 1952, at Stanford, Florida.

BASIS: This investigation was conducted to determine from ANNIE ROSALEA MOORE, daughter of the victims whether or not she personally had had any trouble with any individuals who in turn might have been responsible for the bombing.

Concerning the basis of this investigation, ANNIE stated that she has had two or three boyfriends whom she is no longer seeing. She stated that she did not break off from any of them, but rather they broke off from her. She stated that she has never had any boyfriends around Mims.

She furnished the following names as being those boyfriends who had broken off from her:

CURTIS LATIMORE - ANNIE stated she had gone with LATIMORE while she was attending school at Daytona Beach. She stated she believes LATIMORE has since left school and returned to some unknown point in California.

CLARENCE McKNIGHT - She stated she knew McKNIGHT at school and that he lived in Ocala. She stated she believes he is teaching school at Sarasota at the present time.

CECIL HARRIS - ANNIE stated HARRIS' home was in Tampa, Florida but that he is teaching somewhere in the vicinity of Miami at the present time.

In addition ANNIE stated that she has never had any trouble with any of her girlfriends either in or around Mims or elsewhere.

Concerning activities of her family from the time of her arrival at Mims to December 25, 1951, ANNIE substantially substantiated the story told by her mother as previously reported in the report and furnished the same information she furnished interview Agents on December 31, 1951, reported herein.

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Sergeant SIMMS said that he had learned from his brother's wife that HARRY, the victim, had been extensively engaged in investigation of the "Groveland Case" and that he understood the case was coming up for trial in the immediate future. The Sergeant indicated he had arrived from Seattle, Washington at Mims on December 20, 1951.

Sergeant SIMMS said that he had been unable to develop any information which would indicate the identity of the individual responsible.

12-27-51 ARNOLD SIMMS, Mims, Florida, advised that he had known the victim HARRY MOORE and his wife for a period of 25 years and he verified the story as reported above by Sergeant SIMMS concerning the Christmas dinner had in his home during the afternoon and evening hours of December 25, 1951 and he said that he had retired shortly after the victim and his family had departed from his house and that he was not awakened by the noise, force or impact of the blast but was, in fact, awakened by his wife who had informed him that she had heard screams coming from HARRY's house and that someone was calling for GEORGE and ARNOLD.

He said that he had accompanied his brother to the victim's home and described as did his brother the scene which greeted them upon their arrival. They made their way into the front of the house and the daughter of the victim was screaming and crying and yelling that "something has happened to Daddy." He said that together he and his brother had removed the victim and his wife from the mass of debris in the bedroom and had placed them in his brother's car. He said that the victim, HARRY, was clad in his pajamas and there were no visible marks or lacerations immediately apparent and he was unable to state whether or not any bones in the victim's body were broken. He said that neither HARRY nor his wife was able to speak during the ensuing trip to the Sanford Hospital and that during the recent past or on Christmas day or Christmas night had he noted no one particularly suspicious or out of the ordinary hanging around the vicinity of MOORE's residence. ARNOLD SIMMS said that he knew nothing of the victim's immediate past activities and that the victim and his wife had not been to their home in Mims during the past month or so until the time of their arrival on December 17 or 18, 1951 when they came up from Lake Park, Florida, where they have more recently been living.

ARNOLD SIMMS said that he knew by reading the newspapers and from information he had obtained from others in the community, that HARRY had most recently been engaged in investigation of the Groveland matter and that he had been accompanied on that investigation, he believed, by THURGOOD MARSHAL, an NAACP representative and some attorney named MCGILL out of Jacksonville, Florida. The nature and extent of the victim's activity in this field

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EDWIN H. DUFF II, he was again interviewed at which time he verified all information previously furnished and in addition, stated that he had heard something, though remembered no details concerning the fact, that HARRY MOORE had been run out of Orlando after a meeting there. ARNOLD was unable to elaborate on this rumor but suggested that his sister VALERIE SIMS be contacted at Melbourne, Florida as he had gotten this information from VALERIE. It is pointed out that VALERIE is a sister of victim HARRIETT MOORE and ARNOLD SIMS. It was ARNOLD'S opinion that this incident resulted directly from the work being carried on by HARRY MOORE in connection with the trial of the two subjects of the Groveland case, WALTER LEE IRVIN and SAMUEL SHEPHERD.

ARNOLD mentioned ELMER SIMS and JOHN GILBERT as being, in his estimation two men who were the closest to HARRY MOORE in his work and he felt that these two men would know most about HARRY'S more recent works and travels.

AT MELBOURNE, FLORIDA.

On December 28, 1951 MELVIN CORBETT, who resides in Melbourne, Florida, advised that he was a nephew of HARRY T. and HARRIETT MOORE, victims. He said his mother and HARRIETT were sisters. MELVIN said he did not see HARRY MOORE very often but occasionally he and HARRIETT would visit them for a few minutes when they were traveling through Melbourne.

MELVIN said that since his uncle was killed he had heard that his uncle had told a NORMAN CORTES that he was "going to do something if it cost his life." MELVIN said he was not able to elaborate on what that meant, however, he was sure NORMAN CORTES could furnish the details.

MELVIN stated he had heard from his mother that HARRY MOORE had, sometime in the past had trouble in Groveland, Florida and that he, HARRY, had been "run into Orange County".

MELVIN said that he had last seen HARRY MOORE on Christmas day at the victim's home. He said they had talked a few minutes about the McCALL case and also about the payment of the NAACP dues. He said that HARRY did not express at the time any fears nor did his general demeanor indicate that he anticipated any trouble whatsoever.

NORMAN CORTES, who owns a small grocery store in Melbourne, Florida, advised that he has known the victim, HARRY MOORE, for several years. He said that he has only seen him once in the past month, on which occasion they had quite a discussion concerning the Groveland case. CORTES said that he told HARRY MOORE on the occasion of their last meeting that he felt he, HARRY MOORE,

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WILLIAM DAUTRY was interviewed at his pressing club in Titusville, Florida and he recalled specifically the incident in question and stated that either the first or second day subsequent to the bombing of the MOORE house he and ANNIE SIMMS were discussing the bombing with a reporter from the Titusville NEWS, JACK JESSE. DAUTRY explained JESSE is a white man and that ANNIE had told him two men had come to her residence sometime during the summer making inquiry as to the whereabouts of MOORE. He stated ANNIE told the reporter she was unaware of MOORE's whereabouts inasmuch as she questioned the sincerity of the individuals making the inquiry. She told the reporter that the men were dressed in a shabby manner and identified themselves as representatives of the School Board of an adjacent county. She indicated the men were strangers to her and because she did not like their appearance and since HARRY MOORE had not been connected with the teaching profession since 1947, she did not furnish the information requested.

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ANNIE SIMMS, mother of victim HARRIETT MOORE, advised she was born and reared at MIMS, Florida and has resided here all of her life except for a brief period when she lived at Jensen and West Palm Beach, the birthplace of victim HARRIETT MOORE.

She advised victims HARRY and HARRIETT MOORE married December 25, 1926 and resided in her home; that HARRY MOORE taught one or two terms at Cocoa, Florida, later at Titusville and for several years at Mims, until 1946-47. She stated HARRY MOORE was active in N.A.A.C.P. work on a local basis while teaching at Mims; that she accompanied HARRY to several N.A.A.C.P. meetings; and that on one occasion when the County Board of Education cut short to six months the school term at the Mims colored school, HARRY had organized a colored P.T.A. group in Mims which subsequently appealed to the County Board of Education for a full school term. After two short terms their efforts were successful in restoring the full term.

She indicated that HARRY T. MOORE thereafter used the local P.T.A. group as a nucleus for forming an N.A.A.C.P. chapter in Mims. She advised that while teaching in Mims a split had arisen in the colored school here after JOHN GILBERT had filed suit in an effort to obtain equal salaries for the colored teachers as compared to white teachers. ANNIE stated that as a result of this dissention HARRY T. MOORE was "cut off" from teaching at Mims and JOHN GILBERT (colored) was "black balled" by people in Broward County.

She stated that subsequently a petition was circulated and through the efforts of both colored people and some white people in Mims, after the petition was carried to the County Board of Education, HARRY T. MOORE was

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reinstated as a teacher. She named as one of the white residents of Mims who had worked in MOORE's behalf to have him reinstated one WILLIAM W. GRUBB, now deceased. She advised that as best she recalled HARRY MOORE taught through the 1946-47 school term.

After MOORE learned that Mr. DANIEL HOFFMAN, County Superintendent of Education had gone to Panama City and contacted one CHARLES McCURTNEY, originally from Titusville and offered McCURTNEY the teaching job held by MOORE, provided McCURTNEY would not be affiliated with the NAACP, she advised that McCURTNEY would not take the job indicating that he was HARRY's friend, MOORE submitted his resignation, feeling that he was just before being fired.

She stated that as best she recalled it was shortly before HARRY MOORE quit teaching that he was made state Executive secretary for the NAACP; that HARRY at that time had been visiting neighboring localities to assist in the organization of NAACP chapters. She indicated that MOORE's activities then had been limited to organizational work and she could not recall the date that HARRY MOORE organized the Progressive Voters League in this area.

ANNIE advised she herself stopped teaching when she was "cut off" in 1955; that she quit going to NAACP meetings with HARRY at that time; and that she had never attended meetings of the Progressive Voters League with HARRY, even though he was Executive secretary of both the NAACP and the Progressive Voters League.

She advised that HARRY and HARRIETT MOORE resided full time at Mims until about two years after HARRIETT quit teaching in Brevard County; that HARRIETT after being idle for about two years obtained work as a teacher about 1948 in the vicinity of West Palm Beach, Florida; and thereafter HARRY T. MOORE lived most of his time with HARRIETT at West Palm Beach making trips at irregular intervals to his residence in Mims. She advised that the electricity at the MOORE residence in Mims stayed on all the time and that it was the custom of HARRY and HARRIETT MOORE to spend a few days every Christmas at Mims.

She added that prior to the death of her husband, DAVID SIMS, on May 9, 1950 HARRIETT MOORE made a practice of spending almost every weekend with the SIMS family at Mims but that since DAVID's death, HARRIETT's visits to Mims, like HARRY's, were at infrequent and irregular intervals. She advised that all first class mail for HARRY MOORE received at Mims was forwarded to him by the Post Office but that she, ANNIE, obtained and forwarded bulky mail.

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ANNIE and her son, ARNOLD SIMS, advised that HARRY MOORE had spent several days in Mims, Florida, just prior to the May, 1950 primary election, actively engaged in registering the colored people here. They advised that HARRY had attended political meetings at Mims, Titusville and Cocoa, Florida about that time and that while making efforts to have local colored citizens register to vote, County supervisor of Registration R. I. BAILEY had reportedly made the statement that he would not allow any negroes in the county to register and vote.

ANNIE recalled that one Rev. BRUNG, colored A.M.E. minister, formerly of Titusville, now reportedly residing at Sanford, Florida, had filed a suit in court in this connection. She recalled that HARRY MOORE had written a letter to the then state attorney General TOM WATSON, who had returned HARRY's letter with instructions to Registration supervisor BAILEY that BAILEY must allow the negroes in this area to register and vote. ANNIE indicated that Rev. BRUNG was a close friend of HARRY T. MOORE.

ANNIE recalled that prior to HARRIETT MOORE being "cut off" as a teacher in Broward County, she had accompanied HARRY to the office of the County Superintendent of Education to inquire as to the reason why HARRIETT had not received her teaching contract. In the absence of the Superintendent of Education HARRIETT was told by a clerk in that office that she knew nothing about HARRIETT's job having been filled and that HARRIETT's contract could possibly be in the mail.

She stated that after another person replaced HARRIETT as a teacher, HARRY MOORE accompanied by a committee went to the residence of JOHN D. NASH, then a member of the County Board of Education. According to ANNIE, NASH reportedly asked about a letter which had been sent to the state Attorney General after which HARRY took from his pocket and showed to NASH a copy of the letter HARRY had written to the State Attorney General, inquiring if this was the letter to which NASH referred. NASH reportedly stated that it was and told HARRY MOORE that he didn't appreciate that kind of stuff. ANNIE attributed HARRIETT MOORE's failure to have her teaching contract renewed to HARRY MOORE's activity in the NAACP and the Progressive Voters League.

It was after this incident and after remaining idle for two years that HARRIETT obtained employment as a teacher in the West Palm Beach area where she was so employed until the bombing of the MOORE residence.

ANNIE and ARNOLD SIMS advised that HARRY MOORE had spent about three

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days in Brevard County just prior to or at the time of the general election in November, 1950 where HARRY was active in behalf of DAVE WILBET and in obtaining support for WILBET from the colored voters. HARRIETT MOORE remained in West Palm Beach at that time and HARRY MOORE took his meals at the SIMS residence but slept in his own home at Hills.

ARNOLD SIMS advised he had heard of no hard feeling toward HARRY MOORE before the 1950 election but that shortly after this election he had heard of considerable bitterness toward HARRY T. MOORE because of his efforts and support of DAVE WILBET which resulted in the defeat of Mr. FORTENBERRY for the office of County Commissioner. ARNOLD SIMS stated he had heard a statement, from whom he was unable to recall, "that the FORTENBERRY crew was sore at HARRY because they felt HARRY was responsible for the negro vote." ARNOLD stated that after receiving this information he had driven to Orlando, Florida and there telephoned a cousin in West Palm Beach requesting the cousin to advise HARRY and HARRIETT MOORE not to come to Hills because the FORTENBERRY forces were "sore" at HARRY.

ARNOLD SIMS volunteered his opinion that he felt if the FORTENBERRY forces had felt that bitter against HARRY they would have "written HARRY" before now. He added that after consideration he also felt that the FORTENBERRY forces might have been uncertain as to when HARRY T. MOORE would return to his residence at Hills and might have waited until now to harm him.

ARNOLD further advised that MOORE had not been at the meeting at a church in Merritt Island. ANNIE stated she had heard HARRIETT MOORE say that HUT LER had reportedly said, during the time HARRY was active in registering negro voters, that HARRY MOORE had better not carry this thing too far.

ANNIE SIMS stated that because of HARRIETT SIMS' nervous condition and HARRIETT's efforts to have HARRY MOORE not take such an active part in the Groveland case, HARRY had undoubtedly kept some of his personal problems and troubles to himself.

In this connection ARNOLD SIMS stated he had read in the Florida TIMES-UNION (Jacksonville newspaper) that HARRY MOORE had been present when LEVIN (one of the victims in the Groveland case) had testified and ANNIE recalled HARRIETT MOORE saying that HARRY MOORE had been in personal contact with LEVIN's family during that time.

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ANNIE SIMS, continuing, stated that she is not aware that HARRY MOORE received any threats during the period of time he was working with the NAACP. She stated that HARRY realized that his wife and other members of the family were very nervous about his activities in the previously mentioned organization and that if he did receive any threats he would not have communicated this fact to any of them. She stated it was customary for HARRY MOORE to keep his wife very well posted on his itinerary and that she would have known his whereabouts daily.

ANNIE stated that during the period of time that her daughter was in the hospital at Sanford that she was with her continuously. She stated HARRIETT MOORE was reticent about furnishing information concerning the bombing or the persons responsible for it since she feared that reprisals might be made on members of her family. She stated that after several days in the hospital she decided to furnish any information she might have and is certain that all of this information was furnished to Bureau Agents or Law enforcement officers who interviewed her.

SIMS further stated she urged her daughter to cooperate to the fullest extent and was of the impression she did so. She recalled that HARRIETT MOORE advised her that the shock of the blast had caused a certain amount of loss of memory and was particularly uncertain about some of the events which transpired during the latter part of November and early December, 1950.

ANNIE SIMS further added that HARRY MOORE did not confide in any other member of his family relative to his activities and was unable to furnish any names of persons in whom he may have confided. She stated, however, he was very friendly with a Rev. R. H. JOHNSON who is a minister of the Seventh Day Adventist Church, Orlando, Florida and that he was particularly friendly with a Rev. BRUNO at Sanford, Florida.

Relative to HARRY MOORE's activities, she is aware of the fact that he did make a trip to the office of Governor FULLER W. BURNETT at Tallahassee, Florida, sometime during the month of September or October, 1951 at which time he laid his program before the Governor and was allegedly commended for it. She indicated he was keenly active in the Groveland case and that his activity in this regard fused into the final result, which was the bombing.

She indicated that HARRY MOORE's activity was regarded as dangerous both by MOORE and members of his family but that he disregarded this feeling since he felt he was working in the interest of his race. She stated he

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never expressed any fear but that he was cautious about his personal safety and never stayed overnight where he did not completely trust his host.

Relative to the allegation that she had been previously contacted by two unknown individuals inquiring as to the whereabouts of HARRY, ANNIE SIMS denied she made any such statement. She stated at the time she is alleged to have been contacted by these individuals she was in New York City, having been away from Mims from June, 1951 to October 13, 1951. She stated, however, that she had heard by rumor that two unknown individuals had made contacts in the negro quarters of Mims as to the whereabouts of victim HARRY MOORE. She indicated she had no specific knowledge of this fact.

She added, however, in this connection, that she had heard that these men had made inquiry of HOWARD BURNETT, the proprietor of the Variety Store in Mims, that BURNETT had tried to throw this man off but that Rev. JOHN MITCHELL had overheard this conversation and furnished the exact information as to where her son-in-law resided.

ANNIE SIMS further added that she was unable to furnish any additional information concerning the events which transpired on the date of the blast which have not previously been furnished.

Accompanied by GEORGE SIMS an inspection was made of the contents of the pocketbook of victim HARRY T. MOORE. It is noted this purse contained some names and addresses but no other information of value. The following names were obtained from slips of paper and business cards located in HARRY T. MOORE's wallet:

1. RHOEELL MURRAY, 1323 Disston Street, Tallahassee, Florida. It was explained this individual was a Titusville boy who is being considered for appointment as a Deputy Sheriff in Brevard County.
2. Rev. H. P. YMS, Box 297, Apopka.
3. WARDELL A. SALTER, 35 Blunt Street, Fort Myers.
4. MAURICE WAGNER, Attorney, 322 Second Avenue, Daytona Beach.
5. J. R. STAINIER, 134 1/2 South Beach Street, Daytona Beach.
6. J. D. JOHNSON, Attorney, 171 N. ... 11th Street, Miami, Florida.

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Brevard County to replace HARRY MOORE, however, after learning of HARRY's position he, the young man, refused to take the job. He said the School Board, without a replacement was obliged to give HARRY MOORE his contract and then in 1946 both HARRY MOORE and his wife's contracts were not renewed. Mr. WHITE said Mrs. MOORE since 1946 had twice approached the School Board to request a teaching contract but the Board did not see fit to give her a contract.

Mr. WHITE went on to state that HARRIETT MOORE is quite convinced that Sheriff WILLIAMS and Assistant State Attorney HUBERT GRIGGS knew who did the bombing.

Mr. WHITE continued that he had learned through Rev. R. K. JOHNSON of Orlando, Florida that one ED FLAKE of the Citrus Exchange in Mims had said on numerous occasions "MOORE should have his neck broken for putting ideas into negroes heads." Mr. WHITE said he wanted to give the above information to the Agents by way of background before Mrs. MOORE was interviewed in his presence.

It will be noted at this point that during the telephonic conversation had by BURKE with Mr. WHITE that the latter mentioned that he had learned that a piece of metal was taken from the body of victim HARRY T. MOORE and that he expected to obtain same from the funeral home and would have it available upon arrival of Agents at the hospital. He stated, however, that it developed into merely a rumor, that he had learned definitely that there was no broken skin and no metal entered the body and same had been determined to be a rumor.

Agents were introduced to victim HARRIETT MOORE by WALTER WHITE at which time Mrs. MOORE furnished substantially the same information as had been related by WHITE. However, upon specific questioning Mrs. MOORE revealed the name of the person who had called her while she and her husband were in Orlando, to advise it would be unsafe to come to their home in Mims that particular weekend, stating it was her brother, ARNOLD SIMS.

HARRIETT on being questioned specifically as to whether or not she possessed any ideas as to who might have perpetrated instant crime, answered in the negative though she did indicate, as previously mentioned, that she felt it came from Titusville. At this point she stated that a Mr. NASH, who is a member of the School Board in Titusville, had at some time told HARRY that he, NASH, did not appreciate some of the activities being carried on by MOORE in connection with trying to get negroes to vote in the Democratic primary and that at sometime Mr. HUTZLER had told HARRY his contract was not

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renewed because of his implication in Communist activities. Mrs. MOORE said that HARRY had explained to Mr. HUTZLER that the NAACP was not a Communist organization and that his activities were in no way connected with the Communist Party. Mrs. MOORE said that after her husband explained this to Mr. HUTZLER that he, HUTZLER, had a better understanding of the NAACP activities.

Mrs. MOORE advised she knew very little concerning her husband's activities, particularly in recent months. She said they came to their home in Mims on Thanksgiving day and thereafter attended the State NAACP conference in Daytona Beach on November 23 through 25, 1951. She said on Sunday, November 25th after the conference broke up that she and her husband proceeded to Mims, stopping by their home for only a few minutes to get some things and immediately left for West Palm Beach; that on November 26th she recalled that there was a local chapter meeting in West Palm Beach and also in attendance at this meeting was WALTER WHITE, who made a speech at the meeting, and that on November 27th Mr. WHITE flew to New York City, which was confirmed by Mr. WHITE.

Her husband remained in West Palm Beach making one trip between the 27th of November and the 16th of December. She said she did not recall where he went on this trip nor how long he was gone that on most of his trips he would merely leave, not telling her his destination or when he would return. She did recall that on December 16th her husband departed for Miami, Florida, where he attended a NAACP meeting on the night of December 17th leaving for West Palm Beach on the morning of the 18th. He picked her up on his way through and they returned to Mims, Florida, arriving rather late that night.

Mrs. MOORE was requested to give her permission for Bureau Agents to search their place of residence in Riviera for any papers, correspondence or other material of a documentary nature which might give some indication as to her husband's activities and recent contacts. Mrs. MOORE said she did not desire any Agents searching her residence in Riviera in her absence. Permission was therefore refused by Mrs. MOORE.

Rev. K. S. JOHNSON, 601 Cypress Avenue, Sanford, Florida, was interviewed on December 29, 1951, at which time he said he was the former State Treasurer of the NAACP, having gone out of office in the election of officers at the Daytona Beach conference held in November, 1951. At this conference Rev. JOHNSON was elected to the Board of Directors of the Florida Chapter of the NAACP.

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The following investigation was conducted by Special Agents FRANK F. MEECH and ROBERT L. SUNKEL on January 2, 1952.

BASIS: Reinterview with Mrs. HARRIETT MOORE, victim, to ascertain the exact movements of the victim HARRY T. MOORE during the week from December 19, through December 25, 1951, and also to determine whether the glass fragments obtained at the scene of the explosion and the heavy rubber washer which appeared to be of the type designed to hold a test tube were familiar to HARRIETT MOORE and whether she and her husband had anything of that type around the house.

Upon arrival at the Sanford Memorial Hospital, it was learned by the Agents that Mrs. MOORE had suffered a relapse at approximately 4:00 AM the above date. Accordingly, before interviewing Mrs. MOORE the Agents contacted Dr. GEORGE H. STARKE, the family physician in Sanford.

Dr. STARKE advised that he was called to the hospital at approximately 4:00 AM and determined that Mrs. MOORE's blood pressure had dropped approximately 50 per cent and her pulse was very weak. He said his diagnosis was that a blood clot had formed in her lungs and had found its way to a main artery or vein and was blocking the blood flow through her system. He said at the present time Mrs. MOORE had about a fifty fifty chance of surviving. If her system is able to absorb the shock of the blood clot her chances of survival will be good.

Dr. STARKE advised that it would be perfectly alright to interview HARRIETT MOORE for a short period of time and he accompanied the Agents to the hospital and stood by while the interview was being conducted. In view of her condition the interview was limited to approximately 15 minutes.

Mrs. MOORE was shown the glass fragments and the heavy rubber washer and was quite positive that her husband had never had anything similar to a test tube around the house. She said she was quite familiar with what a test tube is as she had taken chemistry in college and to her knowledge she had never seen anything resembling a test tube.

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In this connection ARNOLD and GEORGE SIMMS, brothers of HARRIETT and ANNIE ROSEALEA MOORE, the daughter, and Mrs. SIMMS, the mother, were all at the hospital and were shown the heavy rubber washer and pieces of glass which appeared to have possibly been part of a test tube. All of these relatives said that to the best of their knowledge the articles were definitely foreign to the MOORE home and that they had never seen around the house anything resembling a test tube.

HARRIETT MOORE informed the Agents that they arrived in Mims from Lake Park at approximately 11:00 PM 12/18/51 and drove immediately to their home. A few minutes after arriving they both went to the Post Office in Mims to see if anybody was there and to obtain their mail and further to advise that their mail should be held for them rather than being forwarded to Lake Park. They were in Mims for a few minutes returning to their home where they retired for the night. Mrs. MOORE stated that as they returned from the Post Office they noticed a car parked on the Dixie Highway at the south end of the orange grove in front of their house. She stated she thought a boy and his girlfriend were seated in the car. She then recalled that this car had been in the same spot at the time they arrived at their home before going to the Post Office.

Concerning December 19, 1951, Mrs. MOORE stated that HARRY MOORE went into Mims to look for a man to help him harrow the north orange grove. After transacting his business he returned home and remained there for the rest of the day. That evening her daughter ANNIE ROSEALEA arrived in Mims. HARRIETT stated she went alone into town to meet ANNIE bringing her back to the home. Thereafter the 3 of them went into Titusville to try to get a newspaper and to mail some mail. She stated that during the time she went in to pick up ANNIE, HARRY stayed at home and worked.

HARRIETT was unable to advise as to whom the mail was directed that was placed in the Post Office at Titusville.

Mrs. MOORE's recollection of activities on Thursday December 20, was very vague. She stated she did recall that HARRY went to the Post Office at one point during the day. She recommended that the details of this day's activities be obtained from ANNIE.

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Concerning their activities on Friday December 21, 1951, Mrs. MOORE stated that to the best of her recollection the entire family was home all day.

On Saturday December 22, HARRIETT stated that she and ANNIE went into Titusville to do some shopping. HARRY stayed home and was home the entire day and evening.

On Sunday December 23, Mrs. MOORE stated ANNIE took HARRY to Reverend JAMES A. MASSEY's Church, the St. James Missionary Baptist Church, which was the same church from which the funeral was held. She stated that ANNIE returned home after dropping HARRY off. After church was over ANNIE returned, picked up HARRY and returned him home. Mrs. MOORE stated she believes HARRY remained at home the rest of the day.

On Monday December 24, Mrs. MOORE recalled that the man HARRY had hired on December 19, appeared and did the harrowing of the north orange grove. HARRY did not aid him but was working around the grove banking new orange trees for the entire day. They stayed at home that evening.

On Tuesday December 25, 1951, Mrs. MOORE recalled that HARRY went to the Post Office at Mims during the early part of the morning. After he returned she and ANNIE went into Titusville to look for a newspaper. She recalled that they were unsuccessful because all the stores were closed. Thereafter they returned home remaining there until approximately 4:00 PM at which time they went to the ARNOLD SIMMS home for dinner.

Mrs. MOORE was questioned about HARRY's position as executive secretary in the NAACP. She stated that his salary was far behind and that the NAACP owed him approximately \$2600. She stated that someone else whose name she could not recall had offered to do his job on a percentage or commission basis. In this connection she stated that Mr. GREGORY of Tampa or Mr. DAVIS, President of the NAACP State Convention would be able to furnish the name of the individual who had volunteered to take HARRY's position over.

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Concerning the last convention of the NAACP held November 23, through 25, 1951, at Daytona Beach, Florida, Mrs. MOORE stated she assisted a Miss LANG and that as a result she was unable to get into any of the meetings with the exception of the last meeting. She stated that there was no stenographic transcript of the meeting made and that there were only the minutes of the meeting made. Mrs. MOORE also mentioned a Miss MIKE (phonetic) of Childs Street, Leesburg, Florida was Recording Secretary of the Convention Meetings and would have these meetings.

Dr. STARKE stated that he permitted HARRIETT MOORE to go to the funeral home in Sanford on New Years Day morning to view the body of HARRY T. MOORE. He said she was fast recovering up to that point and while he would not allow her to attend the funeral he said she was physically able and with sufficient strength to go to the funeral home. She returned immediately to the hospital and to bed. Her condition continued to improve throughout the day and the night until the clot blocked circulation early in the morning.

It should be noted that during the entire course of this interview Mrs. MOORE appeared to be in a very weakened condition and her answers were very vague.
