The Collowing investigation was conducted by Special Agents: FRANK F. MEECH and ROBGET L. SUNKEL on January 2, 1952, at Stanford, Florida.

BASIS: This investigation was conducted to determine from ANGIE ROSALEA FORCE, daughter of the victims whether or not she person lly had had any trouble with any individuals who in turn might have been responsible for the bombing.

Concerning the basis of this investigation, APAL; stated that she has had two or three boyfriends whom she is no longer beeing. She stated that she did not break off from any of them, but rather they broke off from her. She stated that she has never had any boyfriends around hims.

She furnished the following names as being those boyfriends who had broken off from her:

CURTIS LATIMONE - ANNIEstated she had gone with LATTIMONE while she was attending school at Daytona Brach. She stated she believes LATIFON has since left school and returned to some unknown point in California.

CLUMENCE MCANIGHT - She stated she knew McKNIGHT at school and that he lived in Ocala. She stated she believes he is teaching school at Sarasuta at the present time.

CECIL Ma IS - AMNIE stated dim IS! home was in Tampa, Florida but that it is teaching somewhere in the vicinity of Miami at the present time.

In a dition .NNI, stated that shorts never had any trouble with any of her girlfriends either in or around rims or elsowhere.

Concerning activities of her femily from the time of her arrival at mims to December 25, 1951, .WMIE substantially substantiated the story told by her mother as previously reported in the report and furnished the sime information she furnished interviewed furnished in 1951, reported by rein.

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Sergeant STALS said that he had learned from his brother's wife that HARRY, the victim, had been extensively engaged in investigation of the "Groveland Case" and that he understood the case was coming up for trial in the immediate future. The Sergeant indicated he had arrived from Seattle, Washington at hims on December 20, 1951.

Sergeant SIIIS said that he had been unable to develop any information which would indicate the identity of the individual responsible.

HARRY HOORE and his wife for a period of 25 years and he verified the story as reported above by Sergeant SIMis concerning the Christmas dinner had in his home during the afternoon and evening hours of December 25, 1951 and he said that he had retired shortly after the victim and his family had departed from his house and that he was not awakened by the noise, force or impact of the blast but was, in fact, awakened by his wife who had informed him that she had heard screams coming from Harry's house and that someone was calling for GEORGE and ARNOLD.

He said that he had accompanied his brother to the victim's home and described as did his brother the scene which greeted them upon their arrival. They made their way into the front of the house and the daughter of the victim was screaming and crying and yelling that something has happened to Daddy. " He said that together he and his brother had removed the victim and his wife from the mass of debris in the bedroom and had placed them in his brother is car. He said that the victim, HARRY, was clad in his pajamas and there were no visible marks or lacorations immediately apparent and he was unable to state whether or not any bones in the victim's body were broken. He said that neither HaRRY nor his wife was able to speak during the ensuing trip to the Sanford Hospital and that during the recent past or on Christias day or Christmas night had he noted no one particularly respicious or out of the ordinary hanging around the vicinity of MOORE's residence. ARNOLD SDES said that he knew nothing of the victim's immediate past activities and that tro victim and his wife had not been to their homein wims during the past month or so until the time of their arrival on December 17 or 18, 1951 when they came up from Lake Park, Florida, where they have more recently seen living.

ARNOLD SHES said that he knew by reading the ne spapers and from information he had obtained from others in the enamurable, that MARRY had most recently been engaged in investigation of the Groveland matter and that he had been accompanied on that investigation, he believed, by THURGOOD MARSHAL, an NAACF representative and some Attorney named McGILL out of Jacksonville, Florida. The nature and extent of the victim's activity in this field

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EDGIN H. DUFF II, he was again interviewed at which time he verified all information previously furnished and in addition, stated that he had heard something, though remembered no details concerning the fact, that HARN MOONE had been run out of Orlando after a meeting there. ANNOLD was unable to elaborate on this rumor but suggested that his dister VARENIE SIBMS be contacted at Melbourne, Florida as he had gotten this information from VALENIE. It is pointed out that VALENIE is a sister of victim HARNIETT MOONE and MANOLD SIBMS. It was ARNOLDS opinion that this incident resulted directly from the work being carried on by HARNY HOORE in connection with the trial of the two subjects of the Groveland case, VALTER LEE INVIN and SAMUEL SHEPHED.

ARNOLD mentioned ELLER SILAS and JOHN STLBERT as being, in his estimation two men who were the closest to HARRY MOORE in his work and he felt that these two men would know most about MARRY's more recent works and travels.

AT METROURNE, FLOREDA.

On December 28, 1951 HELVIN CORBETT, who resides in Halbourne, Florida, advised that he was a nephew of HARRY T. and HARRIETT MODIE, victims. He said his mother and HARRIETT were sisters. HELVIN said he did not see HARRY MODIE very often but occasionally he and HARRIETT would visit them for a few minutes when they were traveling through Helbourne.

MELVEN said that since his uncle was killed he had heard that his uncle had told a NORIAN COATES that he was "going to do something if it cost his life." HELVIN said he was not able to elaborate on what that meant, however, he was sure NORIAN COATES could furnish the details.

HELVIN stated he had heard from his mother that Hard HOOK had, sometime in the past had trouble in Groveland, corida and that he, Haddy, had been "run into Orange County".

HELVIN said that he had last seen HARRY LOCAL on Christmas day at the victim's home. He said they had talked a few minutes about the MCCALL case and also about the payment of the NAMCP date. He said that HARRY did not express at the time any fears nor did his general domesnor indicate that he anticipated any trouble whatsoever.

NORMAN COLTES, who owns a small grocery store in Helbourns, Florida, advised that he has known the victim, HARRY MOORE, for several years. He said that he has only seen him once in the past month, on which occasion they had quite a discussion concerning the Groveland case. COLTES said that he told HARRY MOORE,

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Floride and he recalled specifically the incident in question and stated that either the first or second day subsequent to the beating of the Media house he and annie SIMES were discussing the banding with a reporter from the fituaville NEGG, JACK JEEE. DadTRY explained JEEE is a white can and that annie that the teld him two men had came to her residence sor time during the surmer making inquiry as to the therefore so fitted. He stated ANNIE tall the reporter she was unaware of MOCRE's whereabouts incomed as she coestioned the sincerity of the individuals making the inquiry. She tald the resolves as representatives of the School Board of a adjocent county. The indicated the sen were strangers to her and because she did not like their appearance and since HARRY MOCRE had not been a macated with the terminal profession since 1947, she did not furnish the information requested.

ANNIE SIEMS, mother of victir H.E.IETT MODE, advised she was born and reared at Wine, Florida and has resided here all of her life except for a brief period when she lived at Jenson and West Falm deach, the birthplace of victir HARAITT MODE.

She advised victims Hanky and Hanklett MCCHE carried Occarder 25, 1926 and resided in her hame; that Hanky MCCHE taught one or two terms at Cocca, Florida, later at Titusville and for several years at Mine, until 1946-47. She stated Hanky MCCHE was active in ManCh work on a local basis while teaching at Mine; that she accompanied Hanky to several MANCH most ince; and that on one occasion when the County Board of American cut short to six months the school term at the Mine colored school, MARKY had promises a colored PTA group in Mine which subsequently appealed to the County Morra of Education for a full school term. After two short terms their efforts were successful in restoring the full term.

She indicated that Hally T. McChi thereafter used the local PTn group as a nucleus for forming an N.AC. chapter in Mass. the advised that while teaching in Mass a split had arisen in the colored school here after JCHR GILBLAT had filed suit in an effort to obtain equal sclarics for the colored teachers as compared to white teachers. AMAL stated that as a result of thir dissention HaRRY T. MCCh. was feut off from teaching at Miss and Julia GILBLAT (colored) was folick belled by exople in Entward County.

the stated that subsequently a petition was circulated and through the efforts of both colored people and some white people in Mine, after the petition was carried to the County Board of Education, Halkey T. HACKE was

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refinetated as a tercher. The named as one of the white residents of Kins who had worked in McChais behalf to have him reinstated one allular and GRaik, no cocassad. The savied that as best she recalled had? McChattaught through the 1966-47 school term.

after Moure Learned that Mr. DaMos hurelist, County superintendent of Education had gone to Penema City and contacted one Chadles McCURTY, originally from Titusville and offered McCURTY the teaching job held by MCCRL provided McCURTY would not be affiliated with the ManCP, she revised that AcCURTY would not take the job indicating that he was just before being fixed.

MCRA quit teaching that he was enderstribe Executive secretary for the Manuar; that Heart time had been visiting neighboring localities to assist in the organization of Manuar chapters. The indicated that Manuar activities then had been limited to organizational work and she could not recall the date that Haddi along organized the progressive Voters League in this area.

in 1935; that she cuit going to what? meetings with Handy at that time; and that she had never attended meetings of the Progressive Voters League with Handy, even though he was executive secretary of both the NewCr and the Progressive Voters League.

She advised that Hatt and Hardell Modil resided full time at Mins until about two years after Hardell quit teaching in prevend County; that Hadlell after being idle for about two years obtained work as a teacher about 1948 in the vicinity of host falm desch. Florid: and there after Hadrell T. Modical lived most of his time with maddlett at West wilm deach making trips at irregular intervals to his residence in Mins. The advised that the electricity at the Modil residence in Mins stayed or all the time and that it was the custom of Hadrell and Hadrell Modil to spend a few days every Christmas at Mins.

The added that orior to the death of her husband, DAVI SIMA, on May 9, 1950 Harriot Number and a practice of spending almost every weekend with the SIMA family at Mine but that since DAVA's death, Harriot visits to Mine, like Harry's, were at infroment and irregular intervals. The advised that all first class nail for Harry MOARD received at Mine was forwarded to him by the Post Officebut that she, Manie, potained and ferwarded bulky sail.

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ANNIE and her sen, ARHOLD SIME, advised that HERRY MORE had spent several days in Mims, Florids; just arior to the May, 1950 primary election, actively engaged in registering the colored people here. They advised that HERRY had attended political meetings at Mims, Titusville and Cocca, Florida about that time and that while making efforts to have local colored citizens register to tote, County supervisor of Registration A. I. HAILEY had reportedly made the statement that he would not allow any negroes in the county to register and vote.

ANNIE recelled that one Rev. BRUNO, colored ...M.E. minister, formerly of Titusville, now reportedly residing at Sanford, Florida, had filed a suit in court in this connection. The recalled that HARRY MOORE had written a letter to the them state attorney General TOM WATSAN, who had returned HARRY's letter with instructions to Registration Supervisor BAILEY that BAILEY must allow the negroes in this area to register and vote. WALL indicated that Rev. ANUNC was a close friend of HARRY T.

ANNIE recalled that prior to Hamilatt ModRE being "cut off" as a teacher in Brown County, she had accompanied Hamil to the office of the County superintendent of Education to inquire as to the reason thy Hamilatt had not received her teaching contract. In the absence of the Superintendent of Education Hamilatt was told by a clock in that office that she know nothing about Hamilatt's job having been filled and that Hamilatt's contract could possibly be in the mail.

She stated that after enother person replaced Haldleff as a teacher, MARKY MOORE accompanied by a condition went to the residence of John D. Mash, then a remose of the County Board of Education. According to ANNIE, Nach reportedly asked about a letter which had been sent to the otate atterney General after which Haldy took from his pocket and showed to MACH a copy of the letter Haldy had written to the State attorney General, inquiring if this was the letter to which Mash referred. Wash reportedly stated that it was and told HARRY MOORE that he didn't appreciate that kind of stuff. ANNIE attributed Harrista MOORE failure to have her teaching contract renewed to Hally MOORE's activity in the MalCr and the Progressive Voters League.

It was after this indicent and after remaining fells for two years that HalfillTT obtained supleyment as a teacher in the heat Palm Beach area where she was so employed until the bombing of the MCGRB residence.

ANNIE and ARMULD blinds advised that Harry MORE had spont about three

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days in Brevard County just prior to or at the time of the general election in Movember, 1950 where Halli's was active in behalf of David Middle and in obtaining support for NISBLE from the colored voters. Halliett MOCHS remained in West Fals Banch at that time and Halli's MOCHE took his means at the silver residence but slept in his can home at Him.

HARRY MCCAR before the 1950 election but that shortly after this election he had heard of considerable ditterness toward Harry T. NOOME because of his efforts and support of Dave MICHET which resulted in the defeat of Mr. FORTENBERRY for the effice of County Commissioner. ANNOLD SIMES stated he had heard a statement, from when he was unable to recall, "that the Fort TANBERRY crew was sore at Harry because they felt Harry was responsible for the negro vote." ANNOLD stated that after receiving this information he had driven to Orlando, Florida and there telephoned a coupin in sest falm descine requesting the cousin to movise Harry and HERRIETT MCCAR not to come to Mina because the FCHTEMBERRY forces were usore at Haddy.

BEARY forces had felt that bitter against HARRY they would have a putten HARRY before now. He added that efter consideration he also felt that the FORTENBERRY forces might have been uncertain as to when HARRY T. MOORE would return to his residence at Kirs and might have waited until now them him.

MNOLD further advised that MCORE had not been at the mosting at a church in Marritt Island. MNIE stated she had heard Hammilati MODEE say that HUT LER had reportedly said, during the time Hammy was active in registering negro voters, that Hammy Modes had better not carry this thing too for.

tion and HARALATT's efforts to have HERY MOUNT not take such an active part in the Groveland case, HARRY had uncombtedly kept sine of his personal problems and troubles to himself.

In this connection whold SIMAS stated he had read in the Florida TIMES-UNION (Jacksonville newspaper) that HARRY MODE had been present when IdVIN (one of the victims in the Groveland case) had testified and ANNIA recalled HARRIETT MODE saying that HARRY MODE had been in persencl contact with LAVIN's family during that time.

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MNIA SIME, continuing, stated that she is not award that Hully MCOAL received any threats during the period of tire he was working with the NACP. She stated that Hally realized that his wife and other members of the family were very nervous about his activities in the previously mentioned organization and that if he did receive any threats he would not have consumicated this fact to any of them. She stated it was customary for HARRY MOCRE to keep his wife very well possed on his itinerary and that she would have known his whereabouts doily.

ANNIE stated that during the period of time that her daughter was in the hospital at Sanford that she was with her continuously. She stated Hardlett MOORE was reticent about furnishing information concerning the besoing or the persons responsible for it since she feared that reprisals right be made on members of her family. She stated that after several days in the hospital she decided to furnish any information she might have and is certain that all of this information was furnished to Bureau agents on law enforcement officers who interviewed her.

SIMEs further stated she urged her daughter to ecoperate to the fullest extent and was of the impression she did so. The recalled that HARDIETT MORK advised her that the shock of the blast has caused a certain amount of loss of memory and was particularly uncertain about some of the events which transpired during the latter part of November and early December, 1950.

ANNIE SIME further added that HARRY MOORE did not confide in any other member of his family relative to his activities and was unable to furnish any names of persons in whom he may have confided. She stated, however, he was very friendly with a Rev. R. H. JOHNSON who is a minister of the Seventh day Adventist Church, Orlando, Florida and that he was particularly friendly with a Rev. BRUNO at Sanford, Florida.

Relative to Hardy MODE's activities, she is aware of the fact that he did make a trip to the office of Governor FULLAR widness at Tallahassee, Florida, sometime during the month of September or Setabor, 1951 at which time he laid his program before the Governor and was allegedly commended for it. The indicated he was keenly active in the Groveland case and that his activity in this regard fused into the final result, which was the bending.

She indicated that HERRY MCGRE's activity was regarded as dengerous both by MCERN and mombers of his family but that he disregarded this feeling since he felt he was working in the interest of his race. The stated he

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never expressed any feer but that he was cautious about his personal safety and never stayed overnight where he did not completely trust his host.

Relative to the allegation that she had been previously contacted by two unknown individuals inquiring as to the whereabouts of HARRY, ANNIED olders she made any such statement. She stated at the time she is alleged to have been contacted by these individuals she was in New York City, having been away from Mims from June, 1951 to October 13, 1951. She stated, however, that she had heard by rumor that two unknown individuals had made contacts in the negro quarters of Mims as to the whereabouts of victim HARRY MCORE. She indicated she had no specific knowledge of this fact.

these men had ende inquiry of HOWARD BURNETT, the proprietor of the Variety Store in Mino, that BURNETT had tried to three this man off but that Rev. JCHN MITCHELL had everheard this conversation and furnished the exact information as to where her son-in-law residet.

aWNIE SIME further added that she was unable to furnish any additional information concerning the events which transpired on the date of the blast which have not previously been furnished.

Accompanied by GENNGE SIMMS on inspection was made of the contents of the packetbook of victim Haddy T. MODIE. It is noted this purse contained some names and addresses but no other information of value. The following names were obtained from alias of paper and business cards located in Haddy T. MODIES wallet:

- RHODELL MURRAY, 1323 Disaton Street, Tallahassee, Florida. It was explained this individual was a Titusville boy who is being considered for appointment as a Deputy Sheriff in Brevard County.
- 2. Hev. H. P. YML, Bex 297, hpopks.
- 3. WARDELL A SALTER, 35 Blunt Street, Fort Myors.
- 4. M.URICE WAGNER, Attorney, 372 Second Avenue, Daytona Beach.
- 5. J. R. STAINIER, 1343 South Seach Street, Daytona Beach.
- 6. J. D. JOHNSON, Attorney, 171 N. .. 11th Street, Mismi, Florida.

Brevard County to replace HARRY MOORE, however, after learning of HARRY'S position he, the young man, refused to take the job. He said the School Board, without a replacement was obliged to give HARRY MOORE his contract and then in 1946 both HARRY MOORE and his wife's contracts were not renewed. Mr. WHITE said Hrs. MOORE since 1946 had twice approached the School Board to request a teaching contract but the Boarddid not see fit to give her a contract

Mr. WHITE went on to state that HARRIETT MOORE is quite convinced that Sheriff WILLIAMS and Assistant States Attorney HUBERT GRIGGS know who did the bombing.

Mr. WHITE continued that he had learned through Rev. R. K. JOHNSON of Orlando, Florida that one ED FLAKE of the Citrus Exchange in Mims had said on numerous occasions "MOORE should have his neck broken for putting ideas into negroes heads." Mr. WHITE said he wanted to give the above information to the Agents by way of background before Mrs. MOORE was interviewed in his presence.

It will be noted at this point that during the telephonic conversation had by BURKE with Mr. WHITE that the latter mentioned that he had learned that a piece of metal was taken from the body of victim HARRY T. MOORE and that he expected to obtain same from the funeral home and would have it available upon arrival of Agents at the hospital. He stated, however, that it developed into merely a rumor, "that he had learned definitely that there was no broken skin and no metal entered the body and same had been determined to be a rumor.

Agents were introduced to victim HARRIETT MOORE by WALTER WHITE of which time Mrs. MOORE furnished substantially the same information as had been related by WHITE. However, upon specific instituting Mrs. MOORE revealed the name of the person who had called her while she and her husband were in Orlando, to advise it would be unsafe to come to their home in Mims that particular weekend, stating it was her brother, ARNOLD SIMIS.

HARRIETT on being questioned specifically as to whether or not she possessed any ideas as to who might have perpetrated instant crime, answered in the negative though she did indicate, as previously mentioned, that she felt it came from Titusville. At this point she stated that a Hr. NASH, who is a member of the School Board in Titusville, had at some time told HARRY that he, NASH, did not appreciate some of the activities being carried on by MOORE in connection with trying to get negroes to vote in the Democratic primary and that at sometime Mr. HUTZLER had told HARRY his contract was not

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renewed because of his implication in Communistic activities. Mrs. MOORE said that HARRY had explained to Hr. HUTZLER that the NAACP was not a Communist organization and that his activities were in no way connected with the Communist Party. Mrs. MOORE said that after her husband explained this to Mr. MUTZLER that he, HUTZLER, had a better understanding of the NAACP activities.

Mrs. MOORE advised she knew very little concerning her husband's activities, particularly in recent months. She said they came to their home in Mims on Thanksgiving day and thereafter attended the State NACCP conference in Daytona Beach on November 23 through 25, 1951. She said on Sunday, November 25th after the conference broke up that she and her husband proceeded to Mims, stopping by their home for only a few minutes to get some things and immediately left for West Palm Beach; that on November 26th she recalled that there was a local chapter meeting in West Palm Beach and also in attendance at this meeting was Walter "HITE, who made a speech at the meeting, and that on November 27th Mr. WHITE flew to New York City, which was confirmed by Mr. WHITE.

Her husband remained in West Palm Beach making one trip between the 27th of November and the 16th of December. She said she did not recall where he went on this trip nor now long he was gone that on most of his trips he would merely leave, not telling her his destination or when he would return. She did recall that on December 16th her husband departed for Miami, Florida, where he attended a MiaCPmeeting on the night of December 17th leaving for West Palm Beach on the morning of the 18th. He picked her up on his way through and they returned to Hims, Florida, arriving rather late that night.

Mrs. MOORE was requested to give her p rission for Bureau Agents to search their place of residence in Rivièra for any papers, correspondence or other material of a documentary nature which might give some indication as to her husband's activities and recent contacts. Mrs. MOORE said she did not desire any Agents searching her residence in Riviera in her absence. Permission was therefore refused by Mrs. MOORE.

Rev. K. S. JOHNSON, 601 Cypress avenue, Sauferd, Florida, was interviewed on December 29, 1951, at which time he said he was the former State Treasurer of the NAACP, having gone out of office in the election of officers at the Daytona Beach conference held in November, 1951. At this conference Rev. JOHNSON was elected to the Board of Directors of the Florida Chapter of the NAACP.

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The following investigation was conducted by Special Agents FRANK F. MEECH and ROBERT L. SUNKEL on January 2, 1952.

BASIS: / Heinterview with Mrs. HARRIETT MODIE, victim, to ascertain the exact movements of the victim HARRY T. MOORE during the week from December 19, through December 25, 1951, and also to determine whether the glass fragments obtained at the scene of the explosion and the heavy rubber washer which appeared to be of the type designed to hold a test tube were familiar to Haddlett MOORE and whether she and her husband had anything of that type around the house.

Upon arrival at the Sanford Memorial Hospital, it was learned by the agents that Mrs. MODIE had suffered a relapse at approximately 4:00 AM the above date. Accordingly, before interviewing Mrs. MODIE the Agents contacted Dr. GEORGE H. STARKE, the family physician in Sanford.

Dr. STARKE advised that he was called to the hospital at approximately 4:00 AM and determined that Mrs. MODAE's blood pressure had dropped approximately 50 per cent and her pulse was very weak. He said his diagnosis was that a blood clot had formed in her lungs and had found its way to a main artery or vein and was blocking the blood flow through her system. He said at the persent time Mrs. MOORE had about a fifty fifty chance of surviving. If her system is able to absorb the shock of the blood clot her chances of survival will be good.

Dr. STARKE advised that it would be perfectly alright to interview HARRIETT MORNE for a short period in time and he accompanied the Agents to the hospital and stood by while he interview was being conducted. In view of her condition the interview was limited to approximately 15 minutes.

Mrs. MOCHE was shown the glass fragments and the heavy rubber washer and was quite positive that her husband had never had anything similar to a test tube around the house. She said she we quite familiar with what a test tube is as she had taken chemistry in college and to her knowledge she had never seen anything resembling a test tube.

In this connection ARNOLD and GEORGE SIMMS, brothers of HARRIETT and ARNIE ROSEALEA MOORE, the daughter, and Mrs. SIMMS, the mother, were all at the hospital and were shown the heavy rubber washer and pieces of glass which appeared to have possibly been part of a test tube. All of these relatives said that to the best of their knowledge the articles were definitely foreign to the MOORE home and that they had never seen around the house anything resembling a test tube.

Mims from Lake Park at approximately 11:00 PM 12/18/Sland drove immediately to their home. A few minutes after arriving they both went to the Post Office in Mims to see if anybody was there and to obtain their mail and further to advise that their mail should be held for them rather than being forwarded to Lake Park. They were in Mims for a few minutes returning to their home where they retired for the night. Mrs. MOGAE stated that as they returned from the Post Office they noticed a car parked on the Dixie Highway at the south end of the orange grove in front of their house. She stated she thought a boy and his girlfriend were seated in the car. She then recalled that this car had been in the same spot at the time they arrived at their home before going to the Post Office.

Concerning December 19, 1951, Mrs. MODGE stated that HARRY MODRE wont into Mims to look for a man to help him harrow the north orange grove. After transacting his business he returned home and remained those for the rest of the day. That evening her daughter ANNIE MOSEALEA arrived in Mims. HARRIETT stated she wont alone into town to meet ANNIE bringing her back to the home. Thereafter the 3 of them went into Titusville to try to get a newspaper and to mail some mail. She stated that during the time she went in to pick up ANNIE, HARRY stayed at home and worked.

HARMETT Was unable to advise as to whom the mail was directed that was placed in the Post Office at Titusville.

Mrs. MODRE's recollection of activities on Thursday December 20, was very vague. She stated she did recall that HARRY went to the Pest Office at one point during the day. She recommended that the details of this day's activities be obtained from ANNIE.

Concerning their activities on Friday December 21, 1951, Mrs. MOD-ME stated that to the best of her recollection the entire family was home all day.

On Saturday December 22, HARRIETT stated that she and ANNIE went into Titusville to do some shopping. HARRY stayed home and was home the entire day and evening.

On Sunday December 23, Mrs. MOONE stated ANGIE took HARRY to Reverend JAMES A. MASSEY's Church, the St. James Missionary Raptist Church, which was the same church from which the fun ral was held. She stated that ANNIE returned home after dropping HARRY off. After church was over ANNIE returned, picked up HARRY and returned him home. Mrs. MOONE stated she believes HARRY remained at home the rest of the day.

On Monday December 24, Mrs. MOORE recalled that the man MARKY had hired on December 19, appeared and did the harrowing of the north orange grove. HARRY did not aid him but was working around the grove banking new orange trees for the entire day. They stayed at home that evening.

On Tuosday December 25, 1951, Mrs. MOORE recalled that HARRY went to the Post Office at Mims during the early part of the morning. After he returned she and ANNIE went into Titusville to look for a newspaper. She recalled that they were unsuccessful because all the stores were closed. Thereafter they returned home remaining there until approximately 4:00 PM at which time they went to the ANNOLD SIMIS home for dinner.

Mrs. MOORE was questioned about HARRY's position as executive secretary in the NAACP. She stated that his Tlary was far behind and that the NAACP owed him approximately \$2600. Also stated that someone else whose name she could not recall had offer I to do his job on a percentage or commission basis. In this connection she stated that Mr. GREGORY of Tampa or Mr. DAVIS, President of the NAACP State Convention would be able to furnish the name of the individual who had volunteered to take HARRY's position over.

THE RESERVE

Concorning the Last convention of the NALCP held November 23, through 25, 1951, at Daytona Beach, Florida, Mrs. MOUNE stated she assisted a Miss LANG and that as a result she was unable to get into any of the meetings with the exception of the last meeting. She stated that there was no stenographic transcript of the meeting made and that there were only the minutes of the meeting made. Mrs. MOD-E also mentioned a Miss MIKE (phonetic) of Childs Street, Leesburg, Florida was Recording Secretary of the Convention Meetings and would have these meetings.

Dr. STARKE stated that he permitted HARALETT MOORE to go to the funeral home in Sanford on New Years Day morning to view the body of HARAY T. MOORE. Ho said she was fast recovering up to that point and while he would not allow her to attend the funeral he said she was physically able and with sufficient strength to go to the funeral home. She returned immediately to the hospital and to had. Her condition continued to improve throughout the day and the night until the clot blocked circulation early in the morning.

It should be noted that during the entire course of this interview Mrs. MOO. E appeared to be in a very weakened condition and her answers were very vague.
