A Message To The

REPUBLICAN and DEMOCRATIC PARTIES

From the Negroes of America

This statement was drawn up at a meeting in New York, June 17, 1944, by representatives of 25 organizations including individuals of all shades of political opinion. It is designed to voice the minimum demands of Negro Americans and to serve as a yardstick for the measurement of parties and candidates. This measurement was presented orally to the Resolutions Committee of the Republican and Democratic conventions in Chicago in June and July by the following committee: Mrs. Sadie T. M. Alexander, Philadelphia, Pa.; Walter Hardin, Detroit, Mich.; Reverend Maynard Jackson, Dallas, Tex., and Walter White, New York, N. Y.

IN the coming November election, the Negro voter will judge political parties, as well as candidates, by their words and deeds as to whether they show a determination to work for full citizenship status for thirteen million American Negroes and to better the lot of all disadvantaged peoples. Political parties and candidates that seek the votes of Negroes must be committed to the wholehearted prosecution of the war to total victory, must agree to the elimination of the poll tax by Act of Congress, the passage of anti-lynching legislation, the unsegregated integration of Negroes into the armed forces, the establishment of a permanent federal committee on fair employment practices, and a foreign policy of international cooperation that promotes economic and political security for all peoples.

The votes of Negroes cannot be purchased by distributing money to and through party hacks. They cannot be won by pointing to jobs given a few individual Negroes, although the recognition of the Negro as an integral part of the body politic through the selection of qualified Negroes for appointive or elective offices is included among the Negro's demands. Negroes are no longer persuaded by meaningless generalities in party platforms which are promptly forgotten on election day.

Negroes no longer belong to any one political party. They will vote for men and measures. Negro voters played an important part in the election of a Negro Communist to the New York City Council, a Negro Republican as Judge in the same community, a Democratic Mayor in Cleveland, a Republican Governor in Kentucky, and in cooperation with organized labor and other progressive forces, in the withdrawal and defeat of hostile congressmen in Alabama, Texas and California. Public officers who have not made a record of liberal and democratic action may expect Negroes to help remove them from office. If their successors are no better, they may expect the same fate at the next election. For if Negroes do not always find a satisfactory candidate to support, they can and will continue to help remove unsatisfactory officials until truly democratic forces shall come into power.

The undersigned are officers of church, fraternal, labor, civic and educational organizations with a total membership of more than 6,500,000. We recommend to the membership of our respective organizations and all other voters that they measure all appeals for their support made by political parties and by presidential and other candidates according to the following yardstick:

The Negro people, like all other Americans, recognize the war as the chief issue confronting our country. We demand of any political party desiring the support of Negroes a vigorous prosecution of the war. We are opposed to any negotiated peace as advocated by the Hitler-like forces within our country. Victory must crush Hitlerism at home as well as abroad.

In evaluating the merits of parties and candidates we must include all issues—those touching the life of Negroes as a group as well as those affecting the entire country. The party or candidate who refuses to help control prices, or fails to support an extension of social security, or refuses to support a progressive public program for full post war employment, or opposes an enlarged and unsegregated program of government-financed housing, or seeks to destroy organized labor, is as much the enemy of Negroes as is he who would prevent Negroes from voting.

We insist upon the right to vote in every state, unrestricted by poll taxes, white primaries, or lily-white party conventions, the gerrymandering of districts, or any other device designed to disfranchise Negroes and other voters. Any political party in power, or aspiring to power, must demonstrate its determination through legislation and through vigorous criminal prosecution by the Department of Justice to protect and secure voting as a fundamental right of citizenship.

The ever-serious evil of lynching and mob violence has become more critical as a result of unrestrained violence against Negroes in the armed services. No national administration can merit the support of Negroes unless it is committed to a legislative and administrative program for the elimination of this national disgrace.

The Senate rule requiring a two-thirds majority to limit debate, combined with the refusal of senators to vote for cloture, has recently prevented a vote on the Anti-Poll Tax bill. Negroes will not any longer accept the subterfuge of those who claim to favor anti-lynching, anti-poll tax and other progressive legislation yet refuse to invoke cloture so that their votes can be registered. Negroes will expect both major parties and all candidates for Congress not only to commit themselves to such legislation, but also to support such reasonable limitation of debate as may be necessary to bring these measures to a vote.

The program now being carried on through the Fair Employment Practice Committee to secure and protect the right to

work without racial or religious discrimination must be continued and expanded during and after the war. No party or candidate for the Presidency or Congress can expect the vote of Negroes without supporting legislation for a permanent federal committee on fair employment practices with a sufficient appropriation for the effective operation of the said committee, and to continue adequate appropriation for the present FEPC until a permanent committee is established.

No injustice embitters Negroes more than continued segregation and discrimination in the armed forces. The national policy of segregating Negroes in the armed forces violates every principle of democracy. Any party or candidate that hopes to win the support and respect of Negroes and all progressive groups must prove their belief in democracy by adopting a democratic program for the integration of all Americans into unsegregated military forces and supporting federal legislation designed to assure all men and women in the armed forces the peaceful enjoyment of all rights of citizenship in every American community.

We are concerned that this war bring to an end imperialism and colonial exploitation. We believe that political and economic democracy must displace the present system of exploitation in Africa, the West Indies, India, and all other colonial areas. We insist that all parties and candidates formulate a foreign policy which will recognize China as an equal partner with America, England and Soviet Russia, and which will resolutely and unequivocally oppose either perpetuation or extension of exploitations based upon "white superiority" or economic or political advantage to "white" nations at the expense of the two-thirds of the people of the earth who are brown, yellow, or black of skin. The United States must point the way by including Negroes among its representatives at the peace conference or peace conferences and among its diplomatic, technical, and professional experts engaged in international post war reconstruction.

We hereby serve notice that if either major political party shall nominate for President or Vice-President a candidate of vacillating or reactionary character, or with an anti-Negro record, it will be vigorously opposed by Negro voters.

We repudiate all persons, Negro and white, who attempt for personal profit to "deliver the Negro vote."

This statement is designed both to make clear the Negro's present attitude of resentment against the shortcomings of both major political parties and to serve as a guide in measuring the future intentions of parties and candidates.

I am sorry I cannot accept the assignment for Lake Wales. I Plan to leave here August 30 for my vacation.

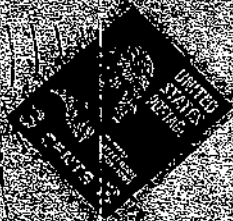

Dear Governor :

I have just received a letter from F. L. Bryant, Old Town, president of the Dixie County Branch, NAACP, stating that the registrar there refuses to register Negroes to vote in the General Election on Nov. 7. Mr. Bryant says that he and some other Negroes attempted to register Monday, Sept. 25. The registrar claims that he is afraid there will be trouble if Negroes go to the polls there.

We feel that voting is a fundamental right of citizenship. If this privilege is denied, we have no true democracy. Negro citizens of Old Town, and Dixie County, are anxious to exercise their right of franchise. They want to have a voice in selecting those who are to govern them.

We therefore appeal to you, the Chief Executive of our state, for immediate relief in this unfortunate situation. We urge that you direct the registration officials in Dixie County to let all eligible Negro citizens register. We also ask that you advise the sheriff of that county to provide the necessary protection for Negro citizens who attempt to register and vote.

Quick action is necessary if these people are to register before the books close. We shall be grateful, therefore, if you will notify F. L. Bryant, Old Town, Fla., when those people may go back to the books and register.

We appreciate your recent reply to our letter regarding the rape case. Payment of your bill will be made at our Annual Meeting in Ocala, Oct. 13 - 15.

To-day I received the inclosed letter from Mr. E. L. Bryant, president of our branch at Old Town, Fla. Mr. Bryant states that the registrar there has refused to registrar them for the General Election. The registrar claims he is afraid that there will be trouble at the polls when the time comes to vote.

It is quite evident that the registrar is discussing a matter that is entirely out of his jurisdiction. His duty is to accommodate qualified citizens who come to register. The sheriff and other peace officers are responsible for the keeping of order on election day.

I consider this a very serious matter, and we would like to have the necessary legal action taken in this case as early as possible. Please let me know what action you would recommend. Also send us an estimate of the cost.

Reference is made to your letter of September 27th, and the Old Town registration matter brought to your attention by Mr. F.L. Bryant.

An Alternative Writ of Mandamus brought in the Federal District, preferably, or in the Circuit Court is the only procedure I could advise or recommend to get the citizens in that district the proper relief. There are only eleven days left before the books close, and any action taken will have to be at once, and requires laying aside of all other business. Fees for same, \$500.00. Court costs and transportation expenses to be itemized separately. Fee payable, retainer \$250.00. Balance on or before the date set by the Court for hearing the Writ at which time the matter ought to be fully disposed of. Upon the meeting of these conditions, at once I shall be in Old Town, Florida as soon as transportation will permit.
