Brevard County NAACP To Have Big Day In Cocoa

Members and friends of the Brevard County Branch, NAACP, will gather in Cocoa Sunday, August 29th, for a county-wide day of a "home" meeting, which will be held at the Primitive Baptist Church, of which the Rev. R. J. Frazier is pastor.

Most of the day will be devoted to the NAACP. At 11:00 A. M. a sermon for the NAACP will be delivered by the Rev. J. C. Bradley, newly appointed pastor of St. Paul Baptist Church. Rev. Bradley is said to be an able speaker, and a treat will be promised to those who attended this first service.

At 3:00 P. M. the usual Sunday afternoon mass meeting will be held at this church. Harry L. Moore, NAACP State Secretary and secretary of the local branch, will open a discussion of that all-important topic, Civil Rights. Mr. Moore recently returned from the NAACP Annual Conference in Kansas City, Missouri, where he heard addresses by a member of the President's Committee on Civil Rights and by other leaders who were instrumental in getting this committee approved. Interesting information will be available for those who attend the afternoon session.

Music for both sessions will be furnished by the choir of the local church. Other interesting numbers will also be presented. This meeting will mark a high point in the 1948 membership drive of the Brevard County Branch. The branch has set a goal of 1,000 senior members, apportioned among the various communities as follows: Cocoa, 275; Melbourne, 225; Titusville, 185; City Point, 60; Merritt, 50; Oak Bay, 25; Fort Hall, 25; Nick Ford, of Cocoa, is energetic chairman of the 1948 drive. Mr. Ford is getting splendid cooperation from ministers and lay leaders in the various communities, and it is expected that the reports to be made on August 29th will bring the branch near its goal. Come to Cocoa on August 28th and enjoy a full day with the organization that is leading our fight for civil rights.

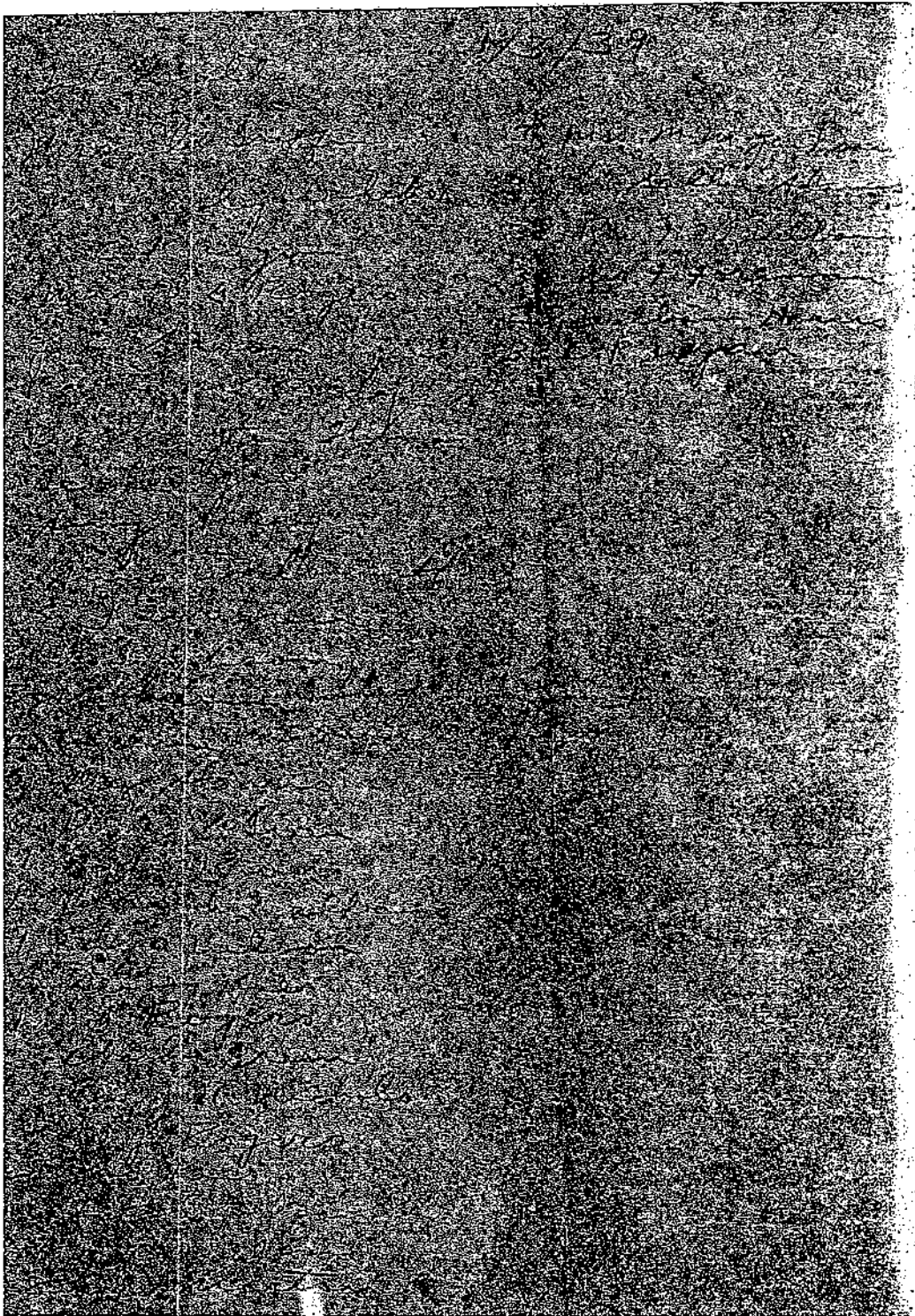

Dear Sirs:

We are asking that you give consideration to certain things that are of grave concern to us. During the past school term this group conferred with the school board about this matter. At that time it was not certain that the \$10,500,000.00 promised by the state would be given, but we were told that if it were given that this matter would be given consideration for the present school year.

We the undersigned teachers wish to have a salary schedule formulated by which we may work with a knowledge of what to expect. We note from the budget for teacher salaries for the present term, slightly more than \$600,000.00 that we fall far short of an equal participation in it according to the number of children we teach. There are approximately 1900 pupils to forty-nine teachers, an average of thirty-eight pupils per teacher. If the pupils per teacher average were as low for this group as it is for the majority of the county, instead of there being forty-nine teachers, there would be approximately sixty. Thus, it seems all the more unfair that our work is heavier while our pay is less.

In its support of the public schools last year, the state of Florida gave \$10,500,000.00 or approximately \$800.00 per teacher unit. This was to be supplemented by the money raised from the county taxes. However, the average salary received by the teachers of this group was less than the \$800.00 given by the state. The average paid in this county was slightly above \$1100.00.

In spite of this great disparity in the matter of salaries, a release from the office of the superintendent earlier in the present school year showed that the pupils per teacher load of this group was the highest in the county. We are asking that you give this matter thorough consideration, and make the pay for all teachers in accordance with their work, training and experience. We do feel that even with the present budget, there can be made a salary schedule based upon the \$800.00 per year teacher unit as a minimum, and increasing in proportion to the training and the experience of the teacher.

We ask your thorough consideration of this matter, and that you will give us a hearing on it as soon as possible.

Dear Co-workers :

After the U.S. Supreme Court handed down its favorable decision in the Texas Primary Case, Negroes in several Florida counties applied for registration as Democrats. We know definitely that such applications were denied in Brevard, Orange, Volusia, and Marion counties. It is quite evident, therefore, that registration officials in Florida are not recognizing the decision of the Supreme Court.

If we are to enjoy the full fruits of this decision, further action must be taken in the courts of Florida. Fortunately, the Marion County Branch has a client who is ready to carry this matter into the local courts. Attorney Lawson E. Thomas of Miami, member of the State Conference Legal Committee, has agreed to handle this case. The cost will be \$2500. President Edward D. Davis of the Marion County Branch says that other organizations have indicated a willingness to help finance this case.

We hereby urge the 25 branches in Florida to join whole-heartedly in this fight for the unlimited use of the ballot. We should raise at least \$1500 for this case. Your branch is asked to contribute _____.

Most branches, no doubt, can easily raise all, or most of their quota through contributions from members and friends. Race-minded pastors will ask their congregations to help you. If it takes some time to raise your full quota, please make a partial report at an early date. Then you can finish up later. Please make all money orders, or checks, to Dr. N.H. Jones, treasurer of Marion County Branch, Ocala; but mail these orders to Miss O.B. McLin, State Conference secretary, 335 N. Jackson St., St. Petersburg. The Conference can then keep a record of all amounts contributed. These figures will be published in the Conference Monthly News Letter.

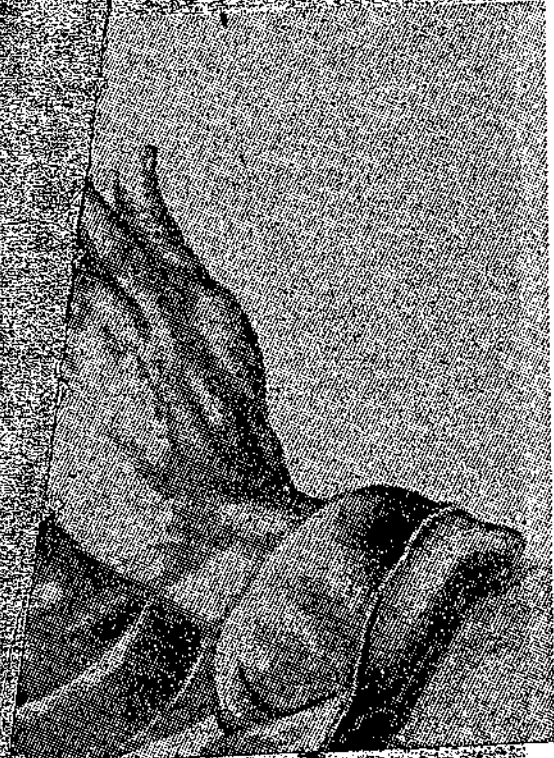

Ford Will Head Brevard County NAACP Drive

In a letter coming from the secretary's office of the Brevard County Branch of the NAACP this week it has been learned that Mr. Nick Ford of Titusville has been appointed campaign chairman of the Brevard County Branch 1948 Membership Drive. In a letter stated that Mrs. Mary Ford also stated that Mrs. Ford's campaign drive will last three years in Cocoa alone and she has to take responsibility of the county.

GOAL SET AT 1,000

The drive will have a goal of 1,000 new members for 1948. The county branch of the NAACP has been in the full emancipation of American Negroes. And when we think of our recent victories in Georgia and in opening up of the white primary in South Carolina, it seems that we should rally to the support of this great organization. We have 2,000 members this year and we feel that Brevard County can easily provide 1,000 of this number. We learned that the NAACP has accepted this position as county membership campaign manager and will go to work in a very few days. More of his plans will be in the columns of this publication periodically. We further urge your cooperation with Mr. Ford in his campaign. On January 27 the Brevard County Branch of the NAACP sponsored a very interesting program commemorating the 85th anniversary of the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation. The celebration was held at St. James Baptist Church in Mims, Fla. Rev. James A. Massey, pastor, at 7:30 p.m. The musical program opened with three selections by the Junior Choir under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Fisher. The audience then joined in singing the Negro National Anthem, after which Rev. T. R. Griffin, pastor of the Primitive Baptist Church, led in prayer. Music for the remainder of the program was furnished by the Intermediate Choir under the direction of Mrs. Mamie Green and Miss Jessie Mae Selmer.

The Emancipation Proclamation was read by Mrs. Thelma A. Massey, principal of Mims Elementary School. Rev. W. C. Brown of Melbourne was president of the Brevard County Branch. He introduced the speaker of the hour. The speaker selected for this occasion was Mr. Ash Robinson of Ft. Pierce, district manager of the A. O. American Insurance Company and a member of the Board of Di-

rectors of the Progressive Voters League of Florida. The audience listened with keen interest as Mr. Robinson spoke from this subject, "Come Down and Join to Go." The speaker emphasized the fact that Lincoln's Proclamation gave us legal physical emancipation and that we are still trying hard to gain the status of 1st class citizenship in our American Democracy. The speaker also reminded his audience that for more than 35 years the NAACP has spearheaded our fight for full emancipation. Our democratic form of government, the best on paper, declared the speaker, but we must make our democracy work through appeals to the courts. This takes money and Negroes cannot afford to finance this fight as separate individuals. Therefore we should make larger contributions to the NAACP and thus enable this organization to make a more intensive fight for the complete emancipation of our race.

A representative audience from several communities in Brevard County gathered to join in this celebration. Mr. Robinson was accompanied by his wife, his son and a niece from Ft. Pierce.

Grand County Ministers and Laymen:

The Grand County Negro Citizens Committee is launching a better citizenship campaign among our people in this county. We are confident that the general condition of our people will improve considerably if we become registered, qualified citizens. We are therefore asking each pastor and his congregation to help us put this program over.

Now, what are the requirements for full citizenship?

1. All persons 21 years of age and over should register.
2. All persons between 21 and 55 should pay poll tax.
3. Each citizen should exercise a voice in his

government by voting for the officials of his choice. Any person who fails to take these 3 steps is not a recognized citizen of the United States.

We feel that you want to become a qualified citizen of your country. We feel that you want to help better the condition of your race and your nation by exercising a voice in your government.

You may register until Oct. 10. The books are in the court house. Now you have until Oct. 10 to pay poll tax. You must hold poll tax receipts for 1934 and 1935 to vote in November.

We are asking each pastor to read this to his congregation and place necessary emphasis.

Please make a check up and determine how many have already qualified as citizens and how many will promise to qualify before the books close next month. We are depend upon your full co-operation.
