My dear Mr. Moore:

Please pardon my delay in writing to you. The facts are that I arrived in the city just before Xmas, and all of the past week (New Year's) I have been ill with a terrific cold and sore throat.

At the Lakeland meeting, Brown was appointed temporary Chairman. The meeting was quite small, and he had collected approximately 20 members. Black was there, as was Calloway who gave a resume of his legal activities.

MacClenny and Tallahassee both had good meetings. I also spoke at Lincoln High and at Fancee. About 250 students remained after chapel at the college in order to discuss the revival of the chapter, and Porter is very anxious to get a Youth Council going at Lincoln.

Even though Apalachicola had no meeting scheduled, I went there and proceeded to contact all of the people whom I know. On a whole they seemed quite interested. Freeman is enthusiastic but his power to convince others is not as good as it should be. I suggested to him that he might have Porterge there on a Sunday afternoon in order to give a picture of the work of the Association to a large audience. Frankly I don't think that we can depend on the principal of the school in Apalachicola to do anything.....you know the type.

Mrs. Hurley has informed me this morning that requests for Youth Council charters have come in from West Palm Beach and Fort Lauderdale..

I believe that interest was created throughout the state as I gave quite a plug to youth on the entire tour. Mr. Felix Williams of Dunbar High School, Fort Myers is anxious to get one in that city, and I have already told Mrs Hurley about it. I do wish however that you would contact him as soon as possible for I see no reason to wait for Ruby to write a routine letter, and I have told her about on 2 or 3 occasions.

Tomorrow I shall a report of my Florida trip for Mr. White and Mr. Current. I shall you a copy for the enthusiasm of the people of my home state is very gratifying to me, and I expect 1947 to be a banner year. Incidentally, for the Nation-wide membership campaign, the country will be regionalized (3 or 4 months only), and I had been scheduled to act as coordinator for the states of Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, North Carolina, and South Carolina. That has been changed however as Mrs. Lampkin must take an extended leave and she has requested that I take over her regular campaigns.

Write when you find the time, and again I must apologize for the delay. By the way, Kissimmee had a terrific meeting, and I was very glad that they accepted my going there.

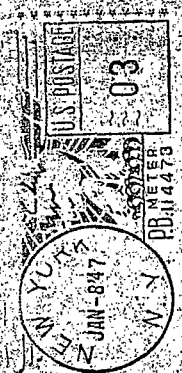

Dear Co-Worker:

"A functioning National Planning and Advisory Board or a Planning and Advisory Board in name only" has been a paramount question in the minds of NAACP Youth Leaders throughout America for many years. Some have even felt that the annual selection of representatives to the National Planning and Advisory Board from the several geographic areas might well be omitted from Conference procedure, since the board never meets, plans or advises.

We who were elected in New Orleans have, along with the Youth Secretary, Mrs. Ruby Hurley, a new determination for the N. P. and A. B. for this conference year. The Board must serve its purpose: Plan and execute a united program for NAACP Youth throughout the Country. To do this it must, of course, meet. Accordingly, the first meeting of the Board is called for February 15-16 in New York City.

Frankly, the budget of the Association will not at this time allow the National Office to defray the expense of a meeting of the Board. Determined that this shall not detract in our resolve to function, we have decided to assume the responsibility ourselves for raising the estimated \$1200 which will be necessary to cover the transportation and board expenses incidental to the February meeting.

Hence, this appeal directly to you. As Chairman of the 9th Annual Conference, I am confident that we can raise any amount of money necessary to assure Youth its full voice in the work of the Association, and that each Youth Council and College Chapter will immediately begin plans to have as large a contribution as possible in the National Office by the suggested deadline: February 1, 1947.

With this confidence please go forward for the meeting of the National Planning and Advisory Board in New York City February 15-16 and I remain
