

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ONLINE PREDATORS

The 2020 Federal Human Trafficking Report shows that **83% of active sex trafficking cases involved online solicitation**. According to reports, more than half of the children in the U.S. have smartphones by the age of 11 and can access the internet.

Talk to your children about online predators and what to watch out for when using social media.

- Discuss internet safety and develop an online safety plan.
- Adjust privacy settings and use parental controls.
- Be alert to potential signs of abuse.
- Teach children about body safety and boundaries.



ONE PILL CAN KILL

The United States is in the midst of an opioid crisis claiming hundreds of lives a day across our nation. Additionally, the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration reports of increasing numbers of counterfeit pills laced with fentanyl are surfacing with some users overdosing and dying after taking just one pill.

Drug dealers are utilizing the internet to conduct their illicit business—often using social media to pressure children into purchasing deadly substances. Minors may be increasingly susceptible to digital dealers while online.

Talk to your child about the dangers of drug use and how just one pill can kill.

- Have a conversation with your child about Fentanyl and why it's so dangerous.
- Fentanyl is a very strong opioid. It's tasteless, odorless and an amount about the size of two grains of salt can cause an overdose.
- It is often mixed into powders and counterfeit pills.
- **You can't tell if drugs contain fentanyl by look, taste or smell. Counterfeit pills can look identical to legitimate prescription medications.**

Each year, **between Memorial and Labor Day, approximately 2,000 people die in a crash involving a young driver.**

Tips for Teen Driving

- Talk with teens early and often about abstaining from dangerous behavior behind the wheel, such as texting, taking selfies, checking social media, speeding and impairment.
- Consider creating a parent-teen driving agreement or utilizing an app that tracks your teen on the road.
- Encourage teens to set their phones to "Do Not Disturb" while driving to avoid unnecessary distractions.

Remind teens that Florida law prohibits texting and emailing while driving.
