



Identifying Methods to Kill Demand for Commercial Sex

(Salon 1/2)

Presenter: Val Richey, Esq, Senior Deputy Prosecutor,
King County, Washington

Although much attention has been paid to prostitution sites such as Backpage.com, far less attention has been directed to online “review boards” where sex buyers brag about their prostitution experiences. These review boards cultivate large, toxic communities of sophisticated sex buyers by offering access, intelligence, safety and anonymity. Using the take-down of the infamous buyer review site, TheReviewBoard.net, as a case example, Val will discuss the massive, national sex buyer networks that exist online, how they operate, how the review sites encourage and normalize sex buying for huge numbers of members and how this leads directly to the exploitation of women and children for profit. Finally, Val will discuss innovative opportunities for intervention and disruption of these online communities to reduce exploitation.

Human Trafficking Data Collection Efforts in Florida: A Southwest Florida & Southeast Florida Perspective

Forensic Experiential Trauma Interview: A Trauma Informed Experience

When human beings experience trauma, they undergo a process that many professionals – as well as the individuals themselves – do not understand. Most of us, inside and outside the criminal justice system, have been trained to believe that when an individual experiences an event (including a traumatic event), the brain records the majority of details investigators want to know about the event, including the “who, what, where, why, when and how” – as well as other sensory and peripheral information. Most interview techniques in the criminal justice system have been developed to question victims about peripheral information. Some victims are capable of providing this type of information in a limited fashion. However, most trauma victims are not only unable to accurately provide this type of information, but when they are asked to do so, they may inadvertently provide inaccurate information and details. The Forensic Experiential Trauma Interview (FETI) was designed to change all of this. Most trauma victims can and do provide accurate central details but need an effective technique to do so. The technique has already proven to be a game changer in the investigation and prosecution of many forms of violence, including human trafficking.

Child Sex Trafficking: The Mindset of the “Willing” Victim

In her book, Walking Prey, Holly discusses the mindset of “willing victims.” A victim who refuses help is often called a “willing victim.” The purpose of this presentation is to offer a survivor’s insight on the mindset of “willing victims” which will better enable trauma-informed care.

Pornography: The Overlooked Factor in Curbing Demand for Trafficked Individuals

Removing Barriers for Survivors: Vacatur, Expunction and Legal Advocacy

This session will explore new remedies available to survivors struggling with arrest and conviction histories related to having been trafficked. Participants will gain a national view of the proliferation of vacatur and expungement statutes for survivors, analyze their successful implementation in several jurisdictions across the country and focus specifically on efforts across Florida. This will include a discussion on how to incorporate pro bono resources, public-private partnerships and academic institutions to create collaborative advocacy and introduce the resources provided by the Survivor Reentry Project, a new national training and technical assistance effort by the American Bar Association Commission on Domestic & Sexual Violence that serves as an additional resource for post-conviction advocacy for survivors of trafficking.

From 2000 until 2013, Peter Kitt controlled women with drugs and violence for his own financial gain. In 2013, the Clearwater Area Human Trafficking Task Force arrested Peter Kitt and his associates for Racketeering involving human trafficking. This presentation will discuss the evidence against Peter Kitt and how it was presented at trial to obtain convictions. Wiretaps, rescued victim testimony and cooperating defendants will all be discussed as part of this case study.

How Faith-Based Organizations Can Collaborate Effectively with Government

Human Trafficking and Sport

There has been speculation for many years about the staging of the Super Bowl and other large sports events serving as magnets for increased sex trafficking. Such speculation has definitely helped to bring more attention to the issue of human trafficking. In this multimedia presentation, we will look at how various sports events have prepared to combat trafficking. We will delve into how labor trafficking is used to build sports facilities under life-threatening circumstances in Qatar, in addition to pieces on athletes working to raise awareness about human trafficking and athletes accused of participating as sex traffickers. Finally, there will be stories about athletes who have been victims of trafficking themselves.

This presentation will highlight the ShutOut Trafficking Program, a partnership between the National Consortium for Academics and Sport (NCAS) and the US Fund for UNICEF, which uses the sports platform on ten college campuses each year to spread awareness about the issue and to get students and student-athletes actively involved in combating human trafficking.

In 2015, Ms. Archer appeared in the feature film, "Trafficked," also starring Ashley Judd and Patrick Duffy. The movie was inspired by real characters from the award-winning book, [Sex Trafficking: Inside the Business of Modern Slavery](#) by Siddharth Kara.



Alyssa Beck is an Advocacy and Training Specialist for the Delores Barr Weaver Policy Center in Jacksonville, Florida. In her role with the Policy Center, she interacts with leaders in the anti-human trafficking field, experts in girl-centered relations and members of the state legislature to help develop laws and practices that will support girls and women involved in the justice system and/or human trafficking. A native of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania she brings to the Center her lived experience and a passion for improving the lives of children. Her goal is to change the laws around human trafficking and promote justice for children who are sent to jail. She also works for a local nonprofit committed to helping women impacted by human trafficking, Rethreaded.



Dr. Jacqueline Brown obtained her undergraduate and master's degrees in psychology from UNF. She went on to obtain her Ph.D. in clinical psychology, specializing in children and adolescents, from the University of Southern Mississippi. She completed her clinical internship at the University of Louisville, School of Medicine. Upon returning to Florida, she joined the faculty of the UF's Department of Pediatrics. There she ran a small diagnostic clinic serving children who struggled academically as well as medically or psychosocially. Dr. Brown began consulting with NCCDs Center for Girls and Young Women in 2011 and was instrumental in the implementation and design of the *Girl Matters: It's Elementary* program. She transitioned to the Delores Barr Weaver Policy Center in 2013. She is proud to have played a leading role in the creation of the Giving Girls a Voice program, the beginning of the Policy Center's clinical work with a justice involved population. Dr. Brown now works part-time at the Policy Center seeing a small number of clients, providing supervision to graduate level interns and generally offering her clinical expertise wherever needed. She has also provided expert testimony on a handful of criminal and juvenile justice cases across the state of Florida.

SPEAKERS



Terry Coonan graduated from the University of Notre Dame, subsequently working in Chile and Central America with torture victims and the families of the disappeared. After studying law on a human rights fellowship at the University of Cincinnati, he was selected for the Justice Department Honors Program and served for several years advising U.S. judges on immigration and refugee law. He went on to litigate asylum and torture victim protection cases throughout the country.

He has also worked with the UN Sub Commission for Human Rights in Geneva and the UN High Commission for Refugees in Washington, D.C. Since its founding in 2000, he has served as the Executive Director of the Florida State University Center for the Advancement of Human Rights and is an Associate Professor in the FSU College of Criminology and Criminal Justice.

Professor Coonan is a member of the Statewide Council on Human Trafficking, appointed by Attorney General Pam Bondi in 2014. Professor Coonan teaches courses in Refugee & Asylum Law; Human Trafficking; and Human Rights & National Security (FSU Law School), International Human Rights and Film (FSU Film School) and International Human Rights Law (FSU College of Criminology and Criminal Justice). He continues to litigate pro bono asylum, domestic violence and trafficking victim cases nationwide. He has also done leading work nationally on human trafficking, designing and delivering trainings for the U.S. Department of Justice, the Florida Office of the Attorney General, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, the Florida Highway Patrol and the Florida Department of Health. Professor Coonan has also done extensive work training state judges throughout the country, serving as a lead instructor for the National Judicial College. In 2013, Professor Coonan was invited to the White House to advise the Obama Administration on best practices in combating human trafficking. He writes and publishes on topics ranging from human trafficking to immigration law and transitional justice.



Bethany Brimer Gilot joined the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice in 2014 after working at non-profit organizations serving sex trafficking victims and survivors in both Miami and West Bengal, India. She has direct care and program development experience working with adult and minor female victims of sex trafficking at multiple levels of the continuum of care, from in-home to residential services. In her current role, she oversees all of the Department's initiatives and programs within the state targeting human trafficking as well as continuously working to enhance DJJ's efforts to identify and serve this population. This includes ensuring that all DJJ staff receive human trafficking training, development of programs to serve exploited youth, ensuring staff serving youth within the community can access local resources and implementing the Human Trafficking Screening Tool statewide in all of DJJ's intake facilities.



Kim Grabert serves as the Statewide Human Trafficking Prevention Director for the Florida Department of Children & Families. Kim has been with DCF for 14 years and has worked in the child welfare field for 17 years. She is responsible for the implementation and development of child welfare policy and administration for human trafficking issues across the state of Florida. She has her B.A. in Justice from American University in Washington, D.C. and a Master's in Public Administration from Florida Gulf Coast University in Fort Myers, Florida. She currently sits on the Advisory Council for the Greater Orlando Human Trafficking Task Force (GOHTTF). She previously co-founded and co-chaired the Commercially Sexually Exploited Child (CSEC) Committee for the GOHTTF.

Master Sergeant Patrick Guckian has been with the Orlando Police Department since 1997. He has conducted and supervised more than 80 human trafficking investigations from initial victim interview through successful prosecution. He has made numerous human trafficking training presentations to law enforcement officers, nongovernmental organizations, governmental organizations and victim service providers throughout Florida.

Patrick Guckian was honored as the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice Law Enforcement Officer of the Year (2013), the Florida Chapter of the National Association of Social Worker's Public Citizen of the Year (2014) and the US Attorney's Office, Middle District of Florida, Outstanding Law Enforcement Officer (2015).



Dawn Hawkins is a passionate defender of human rights who has dedicated her life to fighting against societal harms that threaten the dignity of others. Her energy, creativity and mobilization skills have revived the anti-pornography movement.

As Executive Director of National Center on Sexual Exploitation (NCOSE), Mrs. Hawkins has developed a national strategy uniting conservative, women's rights, child advocacy and religious groups, including a bipartisan political leadership, to work together raising awareness of the pandemic of harm from pornography. Her initiatives have led to sweeping policy changes of policies that foster exploitation for targets such as Google, Hilton Worldwide, Verizon and the Department of Defense. Through her leadership, NCOSE has grown a network reaching hundreds of thousands of people all over the world. Mrs. Hawkins has appeared on many local and national television programs, including Fox & Friends, CNN and Good Morning America. She regularly authors articles and speaks around the country addressing the harms of pornography and all forms of sexual exploitation and what can be done to curb the growing public health crisis resulting from pornography.

Dawn regularly volunteers for organizations devoted to helping children and the homeless. She is a graduate of Tufts University and currently resides with her husband, Michael, and two children in Virginia.



As part of the Northland executive team, Dr. Gretchen Kerr, executive director of the Compassion and Reconciliation (CARE) Center, builds collaborative relationships within the community and among government, nonprofits, businesses and other faith based organizations. Social justice issues are at the heart of Gretchen's ministry activities, most recently with anti-trafficking endeavors and the establishment of Northland's anti-trafficking ministry 121hope (www.121hope.com), through compassion and racial reconciliation conversations and by serving orphans through foster care and adoption opportunities. The CARE Center provides staff and volunteer teams who serve those who face trials in their lives ranging from prison and jail transition to natural disaster and homelessness. Gretchen was instrumental in the development of Resource Point, an online tool for case management, data collection and community collaboration. She has served as chair of the Florida Faith-Based and Community-Based Advisory Council, co-chair of the Seminole County Reentry Task Force, chair of the Faith Alliance, a church network collaborative addressing the issue of anti-trafficking, and president of ConnectCity, Inc., a nonprofit serving those coming from incarceration, a life of prostitution and sexual trauma. Originally from Scituate, MA, Gretchen and her husband, Greg, have three children, Tiffany, Trevor and Justin and one granddaughter, Abigail Summer.

Human rights activist, pioneer for racial equality, internationally recognized expert on sports and social issues, scholar and author Richard E. Lapchick is often described as “the racial conscience of sport.” He brought his commitment to equality and his belief that sport can be an effective instrument of positive social change to University of Central Florida where he accepted an endowed chair in August 2001 to launch the DeVos Sports Business Management Program. Lapchick is a regular columnist for ESPN.com and The Sports Business Journal. He has spoken in the United States Congress, at the United Nations and in the European Parliament. He is a founder of the Hope for Stanley Alliance and the ShutOut Trafficking campaign. ShutOut Trafficking is the NCAS’ effort to combat human trafficking with week-long programs on 10 NCAS campuses each year starting in 2014-15 engaging student-athletes, coaches and athletic administrators to help inform their campuses. In its first two years, SOT engaged for more 40,000 students, student-athletes, faculty and administrators. Richard Lapchick is the son of Joe Lapchick, the famous Original Celtic center who became a legendary coach for St. John’s and the Knicks. He is married to Ann Pasnak and has three children and four grandchildren.



Dr. Michael Lozano, Jr. is a Divisional Executive Vice President for EmCare Inc., the nation’s leading provider of physician services to hospitals and healthcare systems. He is also the medical director for Hillsborough County Fire Rescue as well as Task Force 3 in the Florida Urban Search and Rescue System. He holds an appointment as Affiliate Assistant Professor in the Morsani College of Medicine of the University of South Florida. Dr. Lozano is a highly skilled professional with over 20 years of medical and leadership experience.

Dr. Lozano has been very active in the medical community over the past two decades, having held many positions of distinction including State Co-Medical Director for the Florida Chapter of International Trauma Life Support, and president of both the Florida Association of EMS Medical Directors and the Florida College of Emergency Physicians. He is a Fellow of the American College of Emergency Physicians and is the President and Chair of the Florida Emergency Medicine Foundation.

Dr. Lozano attended Syracuse University where he completed a bachelor’s degree in biology. He received his Doctor of Medicine from the Mount Sinai School of Medicine in 1987. He successfully completed residencies in Internal Medicine at NYU-Bellevue Hospital and Emergency Medicine at the Bronx Municipal Hospital Center where he also served as chief resident. In 1994, he completed a fellowship in Emergency Medical Services through the Office of the Medical Director of New York City EMS. He relocated to Florida and has been practicing emergency medicine in Florida for the past 22 years.



Kate Mogulescu is a supervising attorney in the Legal Aid Society’s Criminal Defense Practice, where she has represented indigent clients facing criminal prosecution for thirteen years. She is also an Adjunct Professor at the City College of New York.

In 2011, Kate founded and developed the first anti-trafficking project to be implemented by a public defender organization. She continues to run the Exploitation Intervention Project, which represents victims of trafficking and exploitation among individuals prosecuted in New York City, and regularly trains public defenders, prosecutors, and other stakeholders in the criminal justice system on best practices to prevent the criminalization of vulnerable populations. She has provided testimony before the New York City Council, the New York State Legislature and the United Nations Human Rights Committee. Recently, Kate became the lead attorney on the Survivor Reentry Project at the American Bar Association Commission on Domestic & Sexual Violence, a national training and technical assistance project on post-conviction advocacy for survivors of trafficking.

Kate received her J.D. from Yale Law School and a B.A. from the State University of New York at Binghamton.

Rafael (Alex) Olivares received his degree in clinical psychology in 2004 from the Catholic University of Santo Domingo. In October of 2009, he became the Program Director for Human Trafficking Services for Catholic Charities and, together with his team, provided services to 194 victims of trafficking in the SWFL region. Alex has also chaired the Southwest Florida Human Trafficking Coalition. He holds a Master's Degree in Clinical Mental Health Counseling from Hodges University. Currently, he is the Coordinator for the Florida Gulf Coast University Resource Center on Human Trafficking as well as the Director of the Human Trafficking Victims Assistance Program at Catholic Charities. He is also adjunct professor at Florida Gulf Coast University and Hodges University. Alex was the 2015 recipient of the Founder's Award, given to distinguished Hodges University alumni.

Alex has trained over 3,000 law enforcement, service providers and concerned citizens. The center also developed the SWFL Victim Centered Response Protocol, the SWFL HT Victim's Services Resource Guide and the Statewide Guide for Task Forces and Coalitions. The center established the region's first Multi-Disciplinary Team. Alex co-authored "A Model of Multi-Disciplinary Collaboration in Regional Anti-Slavery Efforts" journal article published in Issue #2 of *Slavery Today*.



Carson Osberg is a staff attorney within AI Justice's Lucha Program, which provides direct immigration services to non-citizen survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and human trafficking. Prior to joining AI Justice in January 2014, Ms. Osberg was a Public Interest/Public Service (PIPS) Scholar at the American University Washington College of Law, where she focused on immigration law and workers' rights and participated in WCL's Immigrant Justice Clinic. An active volunteer and student organization member, Ms. Osberg spearheaded her school's Equal Justice Foundation, wrote and edited for the Human Rights Brief, and co-chaired the Immigrants' Rights Coalition. For five years prior to law school, Ms. Osberg worked for the International Organization for Migration (IOM), managing a family reunification program providing reunification assistance for human trafficking survivors opting to remain in the United States. She received a Bachelor of Arts from Tufts University and is a member of the Maryland Bar. Ms. Osberg speaks Spanish and has lived in Spain, Mexico, and Ecuador.



Lisa Pompa has worked in the child welfare and community mental health systems in the state of Florida for the past twenty years. Lisa currently is the Assistant Clinical Director for Devereux Advanced Behavioral Health - Florida providing oversight and consultative services to all of Devereux's Residential, Community Based and Child Welfare Programs. Her clinical expertise in TF-CBT and DBT has played a key role in establishing Devereux Florida's CSEC programs. She has initiated protocols on the treatment of children and adolescents who are victims of sexual abuse, sexual trauma and sexual exploitation.

She has attended and presented at several statewide and national conferences on CSEC awareness and training including the initial three day training based on CCIP curriculum to become a domestic trafficking responder as well as GEMS five day train the trainer model. She is currently the director of services for all DELTA (CSEC) youth and adults in Devereux Florida's programming.



Dr. Danyelle Redden is a board-certified emergency physician at Lakeland Regional Medical Center in Lakeland, Florida. She received her medical degree from the University of South Florida and holds a Master of Public Health degree from Emory University. She serves on the Board of Directors of the Florida College of Emergency Physicians (FCEP) and is the Chair of FCEP's Human Trafficking Education Program, which strives to educate healthcare workers about recognizing and responding to human trafficking victims in health care settings.

Valiant Richey is a King County Senior Deputy Prosecuting Attorney. For the last seven years, he has worked in the Special Assault Unit where he prosecutes cases involving sex trafficking and the purchase of children for sex. He is also one of two coordinators for a King County initiative named “Buyer Beware: A Partnership to End Commercial Sexual Exploitation.” Val has conducted numerous trainings and briefings on sex trafficking for law enforcement, service providers and the general public. In 2013, he was appointed by the Attorney General to the Commercially Sexually Exploited Children Statewide Coordinating Committee. He has a BA and MA in Political Science from Boston University and a JD from the University of Washington.



Julie Sercus is an Assistant Statewide Prosecutor with the Florida Attorney General’s Office of Statewide Prosecution. Ms. Sercus graduated with a Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Miami. She has a Juris Doctorate Degree from Widener University School of Law in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. Ms. Sercus began her legal career as an Assistant State Attorney in Miami-Dade County where she served as an Assistant Chief of the Career Criminal/Robbery Unit. While at the Miami-Dade SAO, Ms. Sercus successfully prosecuted misdemeanor, juvenile and felony cases including First Degree Murder and Armed Home Invasions. In 2003, Ms. Sercus entered the world of civil litigation where she defended automotive manufacturers in Product Liability cases and defended insurance carriers and their insureds in personal injury claims. After practicing civil litigation for 10 years, Ms. Sercus returned to public service in 2013 when she joined the Attorney General’s Office of Statewide Prosecution. Ms. Sercus serves as the point of contact within the Tampa Office of Statewide Prosecution for cases involving human trafficking. In this capacity, she also helps to provide training to law enforcement partners and presents at various conferences around the State. In October 2014, Ms. Sercus, along with a colleague, tried Peter Kitt in a RICO case involving sex trafficking. The case was tried in Pinellas County and Kitt was convicted of RICO and Conspiracy to Engage in a Pattern of Racketeering Activity. Kitt was sentenced to 30 years in Florida State Prison.

Ms. Sercus currently prosecutes cybercrimes, sex crimes, drug trafficking, and white-collar crimes; however, her main focus is on the prosecution of human trafficking cases.



Holly Austin Smith is a survivor of child sex trafficking and an activist against all forms of human trafficking and exploitation. Holly has testified before Congress and consulted for numerous organizations, including the Office for Victims of Crime, the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children and the AMBER Alert program. She is requested on a regular basis to provide testimony and input to law enforcement officials, legislators, social service providers, human trafficking task forces and journalists. In 2014, Holly published an academic book titled *Walking Prey: How America’s Youth are Vulnerable to Sex Slavery*. In 2015, Holly joined Dignity Health, the fifth largest health system in the nation and the largest hospital provider in California. As Patient Care Services Program Director, Holly is overseeing a new program to recognize and respond to at-risk and actual victims of human trafficking in the healthcare setting.



Joe Spataro is an Assistant Statewide Prosecutor in the Tampa bureau of the Florida Attorney General’s Office of Statewide Prosecution. In that position, Mr. Spataro prosecutes organized criminal enterprises throughout the state, focusing on electronic surveillance investigations. Mr. Spataro is board certified by the Florida Bar in criminal trial law and regularly serves as a faculty instructor for the Florida Bar’s Criminal Law Section, the FBI’s Digital Evidence Section and the National Attorney General’s Training and Research Institute.

Prior to working for the Office of Statewide Prosecution, Mr. Spataro was an Assistant State Attorney in the Key West office of the Sixteenth Circuit State Attorney’s Office. Mr. Spataro has also practiced in the areas of criminal defense and civil litigation. A South Florida native, Mr. Spataro is an alumnus of Boston College and the Nova Southeastern University Shepard Broad Law Center. An honorary Conch from his time in Key West, Mr. Spataro is married with two beautiful children with whom he spends most of his free time.

Russell W. Strand is a retired U.S. Army CID Federal Special Agent with more than 40 years law enforcement, investigative and consultation experience. Mr. Strand is an internationally recognized expert in the areas of domestic violence intervention, critical incident peer support, sexual assault, human trafficking and child abuse investigations.

Following the November 2009 mass shooting at Ft. Hood, TX, Mr. Strand provided critical incident and trauma victim interview support. He has developed a new trauma informed interview technique known as the Forensic Experiential Trauma Interview (FETI).

The work of Mr. Strand has been recognized with several awards and honors. Mr. Strand was inducted in the United States Army Military Police Hall of Fame. He was also selected to receive the 2012 End Violence Against Women International Visionary Award in recognition of his impact, vision and leadership in ending violence against women around the world. Mr. Strand was also a feature subject matter expert in the documentary on sexual assault in the military, "The Invisible War," which was nominated for an Academy Award for Best Feature Length Documentary in 2013. He was selected by the Secretary of Defense to serve as the only DoD civil service employee on the Congressionally mandated Response Systems to Adult Sexual Assault as a member of the Comparative Systems Subcommittee. In 2014, at the 7th National Forensic Sciences Conference in Kansas City, MO, Mr. Strand received the St. Luke's Health System Forensic Committee Visionary Award for years of executive direction, education and leadership in providing effective multi-disciplinary training and expert consultation.



Dr. Philip O. Toal graduated from the University of Central Florida with a Master of Science in Clinical Psychology. He earned his doctorate in Clinical Sexology from The Institute for the Advanced Study of Human Sexuality. He is a Florida State Licensed Mental Health Counselor and has worked in the area of behavioral health care and substance abuse for over 37 years.

Philip's work has included stress management, pain management and biofeedback, behavioral medicine, psychoneuroimmunology, grief and loss, depression, HIV/AIDS, sex therapy and substance abuse. Heather Wilkie has dedicated twelve years to leadership and community service in the non-profit sector. For the past year, she has served as the Executive Director for Zebra Coalition, an organization that provides services for LGBT+ youth. Prior to her work at Zebra Coalition, Mrs. Wilkie spent the past four years as Chief Operating Officer for Harbor House of Central Florida, where she was responsible for the development and monitoring of programs for one of the largest and most comprehensive domestic abuse organizations in the United States. During this time, she also served as Chair of the LGBT+ Caucus with the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence where she led a statewide initiative to enhance services for LGBT+ survivors of abuse. Mrs. Wilkie holds a Master's Degree in Mental Health Counseling from Rollins College and has been working with the Zebra Coalition as a Registered Mental Health Counseling Intern for over three years.

Special Agent Bill Williger has been a Special Agent with Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) since 2006. In 2009, Special Agent Williger was assigned as the HSI full time representative to the Clearwater Tampa Bay Human Trafficking Task Force. Special Agent Williger has been a part of more than 150 human trafficking investigations. Special Agent Williger has assisted with the development of Anti-Trafficking Coordination Team curriculum for the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center and beginner and advanced human trafficking training for the Region Community Policing Institutes at St. Petersburg College and the Upper Midwest Policing Institute. Special Agent Williger has trained local, state, federal and international human trafficking investigators about how to work proactive and reactive human trafficking investigations.



Erin Knowles Wirsing is the DELTA Program Manager for commercially sexually exploited children (CSEC) at Devereux Florida. She has worked with trafficked persons since 2006 and currently provides advocacy for individuals who have survived commercial sexual exploitation. Her role includes the support and implementation of CSEC programs across the Devereux continuum of care, to include residential, foster care and wrap-around services. Although Erin has experience working with and on behalf of survivors of all types of trafficking in persons, the majority of her experience and expertise is with sex trafficking and US Citizens. Erin also serves as a Consultant on behalf of the U.S. Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime, Training and Technical Assistance Center. She is an active member of the Greater Orlando Human Trafficking Task Force and is the co-chair of the Victim Services Subcommittee. Her previous experience includes managing a comprehensive case management program for human trafficking survivors in Chicago. Erin oversaw the provision of direct outreach to potential victims and to organizations who work with vulnerable populations as well as services to survivors looking for support to exit and rebuild their lives free from exploitation.

Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Grant Funds

The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) administers the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) grant funds from the U.S. Department of Justice for the State of Florida. The purpose of the VOCA grant reimbursement program is to support the provision of services to victims of crime - including but not limited to, victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse and human trafficking.

Services are defined as those efforts that respond to the emotional and physical needs of crime victims, assist victims of crime to stabilize their lives after victimization, assist victims to understand and participate in the criminal justice system, and provide victims of crime with a measure of safety and security. Eligibility to apply for VOCA funds is limited to victim assistance programs administered by state or local government agencies or not-for-profit corporations registered in Florida or a combination thereof. The funding cycle for the VOCA grant funds is October through September.



