## VIDEO: Attorney General Moody Highlights Fast Facts on Fentanyl Toolkit to Parents During Red Ribbon Week



TALLAHASSEE, Fla.—This Red Ribbon Week, Attorney General Ashley Moody is encouraging parents to talk to their children about the dangers of fentanyl and illicit drugs by highlighting the free Fast Facts on Fentanyl Toolkit. The National Center for Drug Abuse Statistics shows that <u>drug use among eighth graders between 2016 and 2020 increased by 61%</u>. At that age, understanding that just one pill can kill is imperative. Red Ribbon Week is an annual event dedicated to raising awareness about the dangers of illicit substances, like fentanyl—the main driver of the skyrocketing number of drug overdose deaths nationwide.

Attorney General Ashley Moody said, "Red Ribbon Week is a great time to continue the conversation about substance abuse and encourage children to never use drugs. Illicit fentanyl from Mexico has flooded our country and overdose deaths are skyrocketing. As Attorney General and a mom, I know how important it is to teach our children to never use drugs—as just one pill laced with fentanyl can kill."
